### Gallipoli and Naval Heroes Return on Furlough.

On the express which reached town at 3 p.m. yesterday were:—C. Q. M. Sergt. Norman A. MacLeod, a Gallipoli hero, and Royal Naval Reservist Lawrence Hayden, Harbor Grace; Thos. Sexton, St. John's; J. L. Fowler, Brigus; C. Simms, Pilley's Island; Edward Brewer, City; A. W. Peach, Mussell Harbor Arm. They were met at the station by the members of the W. P. A. and a large number of citizens. Automobiles were drawn up in front of the station in which the men were placed and driven to Government House, where His Excellency the Governor extended a hearty welcome home to our gallant boys. Refreshments and smokes were passed around, after which the men were driven to their respective homes. No. 158 Co. Q. M. Sergt. MacLeod enlisted in the 1st Newfoundland Regiment on the second day of enrolment and left here on the S. S. Florizel with the first 500, and eventually found himself on the battle fields of Gallipoli where he was severely wounded in the left breast. It happened that rations were running short in the front line and with no communicating trenches it was a difficult task to bring up supplies. Sergt. MacLeod accompanied by corp. Ebsary made a dash across the opening, but on their return trip Corp. Ebsary was killed, and our hero wounded. MacLeod is the only living eye-witness of the heroic death of Private Fitzgerald of the R. A. M. C. who was killed while attending to a wounded soldier, who afterwards died. The former report that Private Fitzgerald was killed while attending the C. Q. M. Sergt. is not true. Sergt. MacLeod is to make an official report in writing of the sad but brave action to His Excellency the Governor. Private Ernest, No. 24 of A. Co. and Private Neal, No. 241, of the stretcher bearers attached to C. Co., are brothers; all three were in the big fight at Gallipoli. Private Neal assisting his brother to the field dressing station. He was afterwards transferred to No. 7 Canadian General Hospital, Cairo where he remained till April 7th, and besides being wounded he suffered from muscular rheumatism. He was then sent home to England, arriving at Wandsworth, April 30th. He was discharged and sent to 347, May 3rd, and after a brief furlough, which expired Aug. 15th, he will again report for duty.

Naval Reservists Lawrence Hayden and Thomas Sexton are regular reservists and were called up at the outbreak of hostilities, and on being sent to England were placed on board H. M. S. Rowan and when things started to get hot in the land of the Turk their ship was ordered to the Dardanelles, where for a time they were in the thickest of the fight. Reservist Hayden being slightly wounded by shell fire.

Reservist A. W. Peach for the past 12 years has been one of the boys in blue, and leaving here with the first draft on board the Franconian, he was on arrival in England attached to H. M. S. Auxiliary Cruiser Columbellia doing patrol work in the North Sea, where many an exciting chase after the German submarines took place.

On May 8th he was taken ill and placed in hospital at Plymouth suffering from a severe attack of lung trouble from which it is feared it will take considerable time for him to recover. On June 26th he was given his honorable discharge from the Navy and in company with his naval chums he reached here yesterday.

Reservists J. L. Fowler, C. Simms and Edward Brewer, are time-expired men who served for over one year, but have like true sailors signed on the roll once more and after a brief furlough with their relatives will be back again in the North Sea.
