STRANGE SHIP PASSES SOUTH.—About 3.30 yesterday afternoon a large two-funnel ship painted battleship grey, passed the Narrows about one and a half miles off the Heads going south. The block house reported her as the Norwegian steamer Kris Planamjord; the name appeared in broad letters on her starboard side. It is supposed the ship took a north- erly course across the Atlantic to es- cape the heavy fog on the Grand Banks. On her first being reported she was taken for a battle cruiser, and created a considerable amount of excitement and curiosity along the water front.

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
