DIPHTHERIA AND TYPHOID. -Since Saturday evening last the Health authorities were apprised of a 16-year-old girl of Cabot Street, suffering from diphtheria and an 18-year-old girl of Hamilton Street ill of the same disease, Both patients were removed to hospital. A 15-year-old girl of the Old Placentia Road has tyoid fever. The patient is being treated at home and rigid precautions taken by the authorities to prevent a read of the malady.

TERRA NOVA AND EAGLE BACK. The s.s. Terra Nova, Capt. Kennedy, reached port this morning from Botwood, bringing 3,500 bales of pulp, which is being landed at the Furness Withy pier. The s.s. Eagle, Captain Couch, arrived here Saturday after-noon from Botwood. Both steamers had been engaged for several months past carrying pulp and paper from Botwood to Heart's Content, the new winter port of the A.N.D. Co. The ships will lay up, after discharging, for the sealfishery.
