Diocesan Synod.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

July 6th. The Synod opened at 3.30 with the Bishop presiding. After the usual formalities, the Secretaries called the roll, when 35 Clergy and 23 Lay Delegates answered to their names. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Mr. Higgett's Bill to amend Chap. 7 and 9 of the Constitution was read a second time, and upon motion of the introducer the House went into Committee on the same. After considerable discussion which brought forth the debating powers of the Synod, the Committee rose without reporting, and the House resumed. At 5.15 recess was taken.

EVENING SESSION.

The House met at 7.30 the Lord Bishop in the chair. After prayers, 41 Clergy and 60 Lay Delegates answered the Roll call. Before the House settled down to business the Rev. Canon Smart introduced the Rev. Mr. Clarke, of the Protestant Episcopal Church of America, to the Bishop and members of Synod. Mr. Clarke was the bearer of a letter from the Rt. Rev. Bishop Lloyd conveying the greetings of the American Church to the Church in the Diocese of Newfoundland. The Bishop on behalf of the Synod in session as well as the whole Church in Newfoundland extended to Mr. Clarke the right hand of fellowship, and a whole-hearted welcome was accorded the visiting cleric who took a seat among the Brethren. Mr. Clarke is here in connection with the Forward Missionary Movement, and will be heard on the floors of the Synod next week.

The following Reports were read and on motion received: From Canon Bolt, Report of Council of Queen's College.

From Mr. Barton, Report of Committee on the Ordination Candidates Fund.

Canon Field presented the Report of the Committee on Sunday Schools which was on motion received and adopted.

The following Resolution of sympathy was passed by a standing vote: "The Synod begs to record an expression of profound sorrow for the death of Mr. John Shannon Munn, Lay Delegate for Burgeo, who was drowned with his little daughter in the wreck of the S. S. Florizel on the 24th of February last."

Mr. Munn by the sunshine of his personality, and his loyal manly life endeared himself to all who knew him.

His generosity to the poor and to every good cause will long be remembered.

His ability in business was as remarkable as his integrity of life, and ought to be a perpetual inspiration to the men of his day.

The Synod begs to tender its respectful sympathy to his wife and mother in their great sorrow and bereavement.

Canon Smart moved the following Resolution:—"That the Synod sends its greetings to Canon Smith and to wish him, on this the anniversary of his birth, peace of soul, clearness of mind, and (if God will) strength of body through the days that remain to him." Carried unanimously by a standing vote.

The remaining sections of the Executive's Report were then taken up. An interesting discussion took place from both sides of the House on this unfinished portion of the Report, and as Canon Bolt unfolded the condition of the various funds such as the C. W. and O. fund, H. and P. M. fund, C. R. fund, and other important items he was bombarded with questions from Clergy and Laymen, which were answered satisfactorily.

All the sections having been passed, the whole report, with the Auditors report, was adopted.

The election of the Executive was then proceeded with, and while the scrutineers were out counting the ballots a deputation was received from the Permanent Marine Disaster Committee consisting of Hons. W. J. Ellis, President; Dr. Robinson, P. M. G., Secretary; and Mr. R. Watson. After the Bishop had welcomed the Deputation, the Hon. Mr. Ellis in a few remarks, spoke of the needs of such a fund. Dr. J. Alex. Robinson, P. M. G., in chaste and eloquent diction gave an interesting account of the Fund and the needs existing for such since its inception. The Bishop in replying assured the Delegation that the Synod was with them in this work and will do all that in them lies when the appeals are made for support. The Deputation then withdrew, the whole Synod standing.

Rev. Mr. Higgett introduced his Resolutions re the creation of a Standing Committee of the Synod on H. and F. Missions, and in an earnest and well thought out speech outlined what the work of the Committee would be. At this stage the Executive announced they were ready to report the result of the election of the Executive Committee of the Synod, and further consideration of Mr. Higgett's Resolutions was deferred.

Dr. Blackall moved the following resolution:—RESOLVED,—That the Synod record the deep sorrow it experiences on account of the death of the Rev. C. W. Hollands who previous to his death, on May 8th last, had served as a Priest in this Diocese for 37 years. Our late brother was indefatigable in the discharge of his duties, a devoted servant of the Church and a man of

At 10.15 the Bishop pronounced the Benediction and the House adjourned.
