TASMANIA.

The Antipodean island from which Sir Wm. L. Allardye comes to be the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of this colony, was formerly known as Van Diemen's Land, and took its original name from the Dutchman, Van Diemen, who was the patron of Tasman, the real discoverer, after whom it was later named. Tasman discovered the island in the year 1642, and in the 18th century it was first visited by British and French explorers. In the year 1777 Captain Cook, the famous English navigator called there on his voyage round the world. There was a race for its possession between the French and English, ending in success for the latter, as in 1803 the Governor of New South Wales sent a possession party there which landed at a place called Risdon, near Hobartstown—the present capital—and formed a settlement. Fights between the natives and whites followed, but the former were gradually beaten back and eventually exterminated, the last of the aborigines dying in 1876. Following the year 1802 Tasmania was made a convict station for criminals sentenced to penal servitude in England, and many a tale is told of the convict ships which left the Thames and Plymouth for Van Diemen Land. In 1808 the settlement of free immigrants was encouraged by the home authorities. By this, which was quickly taken advantage of, the population rapidly increased and in 1825 the colony was made independent of New South Wales, under the control of which it was administered. In 1828 a large company inaugurated sheep farming. From the year 1840 when transportation across the seas to New South Wales was abolished, to 1853 all British and Indian convicts were sent to Tasmania. That year, however, all this came to an end and the present name was given the island, which in 1856 received whatever blessings there are in responsible government. In 1901 it joined with the Australian Commonwealth. Its total area is about 26,000 square miles, with a population at last census (1921) of 213,877, the decennial increase being 22,666. The State Executive authority is vested in a Governor, appointed by the Crown, aided by an Executive of responsible ministers. Parliament consists of two houses, a Legislative Council of 18 members elected for six years, and a House of Assembly of 30 members, elected by proportional representation for three years, the electors for the latter being all adult Tasmanians who have resided continuously in the state for twelve months. The electorate for the Council is smaller, having a property or educational qualification for both sexes. Therefore it will be seen that Tasmania has Woman Suffrage, so that it

will be no strange thing for our new Governor to find the advocacy of female franchise very active in this Colony. Primary Education in Tasmania is compulsory, secular and free, there being in 1920 a total of 490 state schools, with 38,300 children on the registers. Secondary education is also provided by the state (4 high schools with 1,060 scholars) and by private endowment. There is a University at Hobart and technical schools at the capital and Launceston. The principal industries of Tasmania are agriculture, mining and stock raising, special attention being given to the raising of stud sheep for the Australian market. The exports are wool, gold, silver, tin, copper, preserves and apples. The climate is fine and salubrious, the death rate being 12.55 per thousand. January is the hottest month, and June is in midwinter. Snow rarely falls except in the mountains. Altogether Governor Allardye will find quite a change from Tasmania in the South to Newfoundland, in the North, one, however, which we trust will be pleasing.

Burglary Reported

BARNES ROAD STORE ENTERED.
Pike's grocery store situated on Barnes Road was entered by burglars early yesterday morning on Monday night, and a quantity of goods stolen. The robbery was discovered when the proprietor opened at the usual hour, and found the store in disorder and the goods missing. The matter is now in the hands of the police, and an arrest is expected today. During the past few weeks there has been an epidemic of robberies and practically all the police court cases yesterday were for this offence. The Penitentiary has some 80 prisoners in residence, a large number of which were convicted of larceny.

P. T. Messengers Get New Uniforms.

Will Have Comfortable Quarters.
A change is being made in the style of the uniforms of the Postal Telegraph messengers and the new suits which the lads are now receiving give them a very smart appearance. New caps will be issued shortly. The boys will soon be quitting their present cramped place in the Post Office lobby and moved to splendidly appointed rooms in the new annex. Through the courtesy of Secretary Campbell a Telegram reporter was yesterday evening shown the new quarters for the boys. They are situated on the main flat of the annex for the Postal Telegraph and Parcel Post delivery. Placed conveniently they may be entered from the street or through the lobby of the General Post Office. A wash room and other conveniences are attached to the quarters. The new annex is fast nearing completion and the contractor hopes to have all the work finished early next month. On the top flat of the building will be situated the operating rooms, whilst the main flat will contain, besides the quarters for the boys, a public waiting room. The interior is finished with plaster with pitch pine wainscoting and trimmings.

New Supervisor of Works.

Owing to the illness of Mr. John Davey, who has for some time acted as supervisor of the Government Relief Works, and the necessity of strict supervision over the work now in progress, it has been found necessary to find some suitable person to undertake the job in his absence. The services of Mr. John Coaker of the Municipal Council staff have been solicited, and it is not improbable, with the consent of the Council, he will accept the job pro tem. A more competent official would be hard to find.

Hotel Project for Bermuda.

GILT EDGE LABOR REQUIRED.

A number of gilt-edge laborers and tradesmen are being sought in the city to proceed to Bermuda where work on a million dollar hotel is offered. Hon. J. P. Hand, who is already the proprietor of a hotel in Bermuda and also an interested party in several others, is the moving spirit behind this new hotel. He has recently been in London, where he floated the new company, with a capitalization of \$1,500,000. The project appealed to the English investor, and little difficulty was found in securing the necessary capital. The work of construction starts in the fall and arrangements are now being made to engage 100 carpenters and laborers in St. John's, who will be leaving here in October. Free transportation is being offered from Halifax and should the men prove satisfactory free transportation home will be given at the completion of the job. It is understood that the government is being asked to go sponsor for the men's conduct, and a guarantee that they will not misbehave themselves is being asked. It is understood the selection of the men is being left in charge of Major Butler, of the local Employment Bureau.
