CENTRAL HEATING  
 Successfully Operated.

Those who doubt either the effi-  
 ciency or the practicability of cen-  
 tral heating for centres of population  
 should visit Ottawa and there view  
 the system by which the Government  
 buildings are served. The Govern-  
 ment's central heating plant at Ot-  
 tawa takes care of twelve million  
 cubic feet, which is about equal to  
 three thousand five hundred moder-  
 ated dwelling houses, or to put it  
 another way, reckoning five to a  
 house, a single plant of sufficient size  
 to take care of the houses of a popu-  
 lation of 17,500 individuals.

The Government plant is located  
 over a mile from the most remote  
 building that it heats, the city post-  
 office; and even in this case it is  
 quite as effective as an individual  
 heating plant would be. This service  
 gives both steam and hot water heat-  
 ing. For instance, the House of Com-  
 mons and the Senate are heated by  
 steam, while hot water is utilized in  
 some six hundred other apartments.  
 The hot water is supplied by what  
 is known as the forced circulation  
 system, that is to say it is pumped  
 under pressure from the power house  
 through the miles of pipes and back  
 again. And the interesting part of it  
 is that the heat loss on this long  
 journey through the pipes and radi-  
 ators to and from the power house, is  
 less than thirteen degrees.

### Wonders of the Future.

SOME INVENTIONS THE WORLD  
 IS WAITING FOR.  
 Sir William Bull, speaking in Lon-  
 don recently, enumerated some of the  
 problems which might well occupy  
 the attention of inventors. His sug-  
 gestions included glass that will  
 bend, a smooth-road surface that will  
 not get slippery in wet weather. A  
 safe frying machine that can be used  
 by a boy or girl, a pipe that can be  
 simply and effectively cleaned, a  
 temperance drink that will not pall  
 upon the palate, a process to render  
 flannel unshrinkable, a noiseless  
 typewriter, a noiseless gun, and a  
 non-creaking top-stair for late hus-  
 bands.  
 Professor Low said hundreds of

years hence people will ridicule the  
 idea of risking getting wet through  
 when they went shopping, and the  
 day would come when large spaces  
 like the Strand and Piccadilly Cir-  
 cus would, in some measure, be pro-  
 tected from the elements. Such shop-  
 ping centres would be like huge  
 arcades.  
 Travel, added Professor Low,  
 would reach a stage when it would be  
 possible to cross the Channel by tube  
 or air in a few minutes. In a century's  
 time he prophesied we should have  
 broadcasting of events as they took  
 place and, what was equally likely,  
 pictures of such events at the same  
 time. That would seem no more re-  
 markable to the people of the future  
 than wireless telephony would have  
 been to a savage.

### Motor Fuel for Rubbish.

A remarkably brilliant piece of  
 chemical work has been accomplish-  
 ed by two British chemists, Mr. H.  
 Langwell and Mr. H. Lloyd Hind, who  
 have discovered a new microbe, by  
 the agency of which some 12,000 tons  
 of waste material can be dealt with  
 annually to produce about half a  
 million gallons of alcohol suitable  
 for motor spirit and acetic acid.  
 The raw material in the waste hops  
 which at the present time brewers  
 have to pay to have carted away, but  
 the real value of the microbe process  
 lies in the fact that it enables alcohol  
 to be produced from sulphite pulp  
 and thus from waste paper.  
 The microbe is stated to be a rod-

shaped bacillus, and it possesses the  
 excellent and convenient property of  
 developing so much heat in its  
 growth that other organisms which  
 might interfere with the alcoholic  
 fermentation are automatically killed.  
 Apart from the motor spirit yield-  
 ed, some 16,000 cubic feet of gas, suit-  
 able for internal combustion en-  
 gines are evolved in the treatment of  
 a ton of waste material.  
 To replace a knob on a kitchen  
 utensil, run a screw of suitable size  
 up through hole, then gently and firm-  
 ly press a good-sized cork downward  
 and thread on the screw. The cork  
 makes a good knob, and will never  
 grow hot.
