General Election In Britain Predicted.

Elizabeth Howard Lost on Her Way to
Bay of Islands—France will not Tolerate
a Dictatorial Government in Germany—
Bavarian Irregulars will March on
Berlin—Preference in Britain Meets with
Opposition.

MAIN'S POLITICAL POT BOILING.

LONDON, Nov. 8.

More than one paper this morning
predicted the suggestion that the gen-
eral election may come before Christ-
mas. "Panic stricken by the force of
the trade speeches delivered in the
last few days," is the condition, of
the prepared to support the Prem-
ier, according to the Daily News,
which will have nothing to do with
election and thinks the protection-
ists are eager to jockey the Premier
into a snap election. Another sug-
gestion abroad, that a full meeting of
the Unionist Party should be called,

PREFERENCE PROPOSALS AT- TACKED.

LONDON, Nov. 8.

Attacked by Free Traders as a tax

on the poor man's lunch, Great Brit-
ain's new preference proposals are
already the centre of much contro-
versy. The Daily News asserts that
as a result of the preference, every
pound tin of salmon and every pound
pot of honey from outside the Empire
will cost a penny more wholesale.
Every quart bottle of fruit juice will
jump three halfpence, according to
the News, and every pound of foreign
apples a half penny.

The Westminster Gazette says one
by one the delicacies of the working-
man's table are being added to the
schedule of things to be taxed and ad-
ded to food that will cost more to buy.
None of the preference proposals
will become effective until they have
parliamentary sanction. The Imperial
Conference made a last hour addition
of wines to preferential tariff offer.
Australia and South Africa lately
have been purchasing their wines on
the English market.

FRANCE WILL NOT TOLERATE DICTATORIAL GOVT. IN GER- MANY.

PARIS, Nov. 8.
The French Government has in-
structed its ambassador in Berlin to
inform the German Government that
France would not tolerate the estab-
lishment of a dictatorial government
in Germany.

BAVARIAN IRREGULARS TO MARCH ON BERLIN.

LONDON, Nov. 8.
The Berlin correspondent of the Ex-
change Telegraph forwards a tele-
gram from Munich which says the
Bavarian Irregulars have decided to
march on Berlin to-morrow.

POINCARÉ GIVES EVASIVE REPLY

BERLIN, Nov. 8.
Premier Poincaré, replying to the re-
cent German protests against the atti-
tude of French General De Metz in
the Bavarian Palatinate, informed
Berlin that the French Government
was entirely unconcerned with re-
parations for Separatists' action in
either the Palatinate or Rhine Pro-
vince, and would continue to be so. A
semi-official statement announcing re-
ceipt of the reply says that it evaded
answering the complaints against De
Metz.

REBELS DEFEATED.

TRIPOLI, Nov. 8.
Italian troops in Tripoli have in-
flicted another defeat upon the rebel-
lous tribesmen in a sharp attack near
Nahut, the natives losing a hundred
killed while the Italian casualties
were two dead and thirteen wounded,
all native soldiers.

URGES RETURN OF SHIPPING BUSINESS TO PRIVATE HANDS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.
The American Marine Conference
to-day passed resolutions calling upon
the Shipping Board and Emergency
Fleet Corporation to retire without
delay from the business of operating
ships and to place the business in pri-
vate hands.

ANOTHER GRADE CROSSING DISASTER.

ASHLAND, Ky., Nov. 8.
Five persons were instantly killed
and one probably fatally injured this
afternoon when a motor bus running
between Ashland and Ironton, Ohio,
was struck at a grade crossing by a
Chesapeake and Ohio train.

ZEY SCORES ANOTHER VICTORY.

PIMLICO, Nov. 8.
Champion Zey to-day won the Pim-
lico serial weight for age race, dis-
tance one and one-eighth miles. He
had for opponents only Home Stretch,
the good distance performer, and the
old sprinter Trystar.

A NEW STAR.

LONDON, Nov. 8.
An amateur astronomer in Cape
Town has discovered what is believed
to be a new comet. The discovery has
been communicated to the Royal Ob-
servatory at Cape Town, which has
taken photographs of the strange new
stellar object.

OIL COMPANY SPLITS.

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.
The Ottoman American Develop-
ment Company, holders of extensive
concessions in Turkey, including the
Chester concession, which has for
long been a bone of contention about
the Council tables of Europe, was
split open to-day by the resignation of
several of the most powerful trustees
and directors, as the result of an at-
tempt to sell one million dollars in
stock to the public at one hundred
dollars a share. The New York Even-
ing Post said to-day.

ELIZABETH HOWARD LOST.

HALIFAX, Nov. 8.
The New York schooner Elizabeth
Howard, twice a candidate for the
International Schooner Race honors
in eliminations off Gloucester, be-
came a total loss half an hour after
piling up on Portor's Island, Halifax
County, in a dense fog yesterday af-
ternoon. Capt. McInnes and his crew
of nine men were saved by a fisher-
man on the island and will be brought
to Halifax. The Howard was from
Gloucester for Bay of Islands for a
cargo of herring.
