Several outspoken electors did not hesitate to admit, and even chuckled over the fact that they had received bribes ; and one of the more enterprising, with an eye to business, arranged with the agent of Mr. Green, the Conservative can-didate for Wakefield, to secure four votes and receive £8 for the job.
