Curry of Tripe-Take the tripe as it comes from the market (it is ordinarily cooked). Place on fire in cold water, with a teaspoon of salt added. Parboil fifteen minutes. Pour off that water and put on again in cold water; boil again fifteen minutes. Take from the stove, drain the tripe in a colander. Boil one-half cup of rice until tender. At the time of putting on the rice, slice and brown in a sauce-pan two onions in two tablespoons of butter or dripping: then add the tripe after draining it in the colander, and enough hot water to cover, season with sait and pepper and let it cook until the rice is done. Add a tablespoon of curry powder to the tripe. Stir it up and dish the tripe with the rice around it. If the tripe is not pickled, add a tablespoon of vinegar before

Italienne Sauce-Put one tablespoonful of butter in your sauce-pan and add to it two tablespoonfuls of shallots chopped fine; cook until a light brown. To this add two tablespoonfuls of mushrooms, chopped fine, and a tablespoonful of minced parsley. Cook this five minutes. In another sauce-pan mix thoroughly a tablespoon of butter with one of flour; to this add one cup of white stock (or broth); season to taste and cook eight minutes. Strain the first mixture and pour into this sauce and let it stand over the fire while you add a level spoonful of butter and two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice. Stir until very

Off in a Crowd.

Forty People Hurt by a Christmas Salute-A Hamilton Hostler Killed.

Asheville, N. C., Dec. 27.-A crowd of 100 or more men and boys were firing a Christmas salute from an old cannon on the outskirts of the town on Christmas Day, when a can of 30 pounds of powder exploded in the thick of the crowd. Thirty or forty persons were injured, but one, it is believed, fatally. The cannon was fired several times, and then Joseph Finich, an employe of the Southern Railroad Company, picked up the powder can and began to reload the piece. The gun had not been swabbed, and the moment the tiny stream of powder struck the heated metal there was a flash and the powder exploded with a report that made the earth tremble. One man was blown or rolled over the bluff 300 feet, nearly to the river, and one had his nose and mouth torn out of all snape, and is probably blinded. Clar-ence Ledford, who stood near the cannon when the powder ignited, was thrown more than 50 feet. His clothing was torn or burned entirely off, and a part of the skin on the forehead burned loose. Several others probably will lose their sight or be disfigured for life. BROKE HIS NECK.

FOUND DEAD ON THE ROAD. Belleville, Ont., Dec. 27.-Wm. Anderson, ex-M.P.P. for Prince Edward, was found dead on the road near his home in Ameliasburg, after attending a Christmas entertainment. He was 61 years of age.

MANGLED ON THE RAILWAY. Springfield, Mass., Dec. 27.—Assistant Division Superintendent Newell, of the Boston and Albany Railway, was found cut almost to pieces on the tracks near the switch tower here. He was formerly a well-known Harvard football player.

DIED FOR OTHERS.

New York, Dec. 27.-James F. Colman, an engine driver in the fire department, sacrificed his own life rather than run down a woman and a little girl, who, transfixed with fright, were unable to get out of his way. Colman to avoid hitting them, gave the engine too sharp a turn and it toppled over,

DISASTER IN TENNESSEE. Chattanooga, Tenn., Dec. 27.-Vestibule passenger train No. 6, on the Norfolk and Western Railroad, which left Bristol, Tenn., Friday night at 9:05, came in collision with a freight train at Clark's Summit at 11:30. The engines of both trains were badly wrecked, as were a number of freight cars, and the baggage and postal cars of the passenger train. R. R. Ashmore, express messenger, it is thought, will die. Postal Clerk Hoffman was instantly killed, his body being ground to pieces. Fireman Collins had both his legs cut off, and was otherwise horribly cut and

bruised. Engineer McCarty will die. PREVENTED A CATASTROPHE. Niles, Mich., Dec. 27.-What might have resulted in a frightful catastrophe as narrowly averted here through the commendable watchfulness of the engineer of a Big Four south-bound passenger train. The train was a mile south of the Big Four depot and was thundering along at a rapid rate, when suddenly the engineer caught sight of several dark forms dashing madly down the track, directly in the course of the train and in the direction of a few rods of trestle which spans the Dowagiac Creek. The engineer lost no time in bringing his train to a standstill, thereby saving the lives of many of the passengers. The dark forms proved to be horses, which, when they plunged upon the trestle, formed an obstruction that would have wrecked the train.

His grandfather, Emperor William I. was also a Free Mason, and frequently attended the meetings of his lodge, divesting himself at its threshold of all his imperial distinctions, conducting himself and being treated by his Masonic brethren as an ordinary member. In Austria Free Masonry is eschewed by the aristocracy and the reigning family, as it is also in Russia and Belgium, while in Holland the Dutch nobility are nearly all members of the craft.—Tit-Bits.
