The Crowds Are Beginning to Come.

All the Live Stock Now Accommodated—Men Worked All Night—Lord Aberdeen's Arrival.

The smile of the sky was reflected today in the "physiognomy" of the Western Fair directors. They knew that if the weather treated them properly the people of Western Ontario would. Today dispelled any lurking doubts about the success of the Fair from a financial standpoint. The railroad trains brought in crowds from all directions, and by 1 o'clock this afternoon the directors saw that the tide had set in, as it always does on Tuesday. It will reach high water mark tomorrow. The gloom of early morning doubtless kept many at home today, but they will swell the multitude tomorrow.

All night long men were at work erecting the temporary home for the surplus exhibits in the cattle sheds. This morning a frame building 150 feet long was completed, properly roofed and set out in pens, crowded out of the main building, were accommodated perfectly. The few remaining over were placed in improvised pens, adjoining the cattle shed. Pawnee Bill kindly loaned the directors a large tent for the entire week, and in this the surplus sheep have been installed even more comfortably than in the proper building. Fifty stalls in the horse stables have been set apart for the use of the prize animals—mostly Galloways—which could not be provided for in the cattle sheds. To make room for these, the horses in the speeding class have been lodged in the old barns in the northeast corner of the park. The exhibitors are delighted with the magnificent new stables, and say they are the best on the continent.

Lord Aberdeen will arrive from Saratoga at 7:30 o'clock tonight at the G. T. R. station, and will be met by a guard of honor chosen from the military camp—probably the Twenty-first battalion. He will be driven straight to the Fair Grounds to witness the ring attractions and fireworks. It is expected that Lady Aberdeen will join him tomorrow.

NOTES.

Judging began today in all departments of the live stock exhibit.

The refreshment vendors have begun to earn their salt at last. Sergeant & Edgecombe made a quick job of the temporary cattle annex. The grounds will be illuminated tonight.

Pawnee Bill and his troupe made their last street parade this morning. The Essex Band again headed it. Four receipts for Monday were considerably ahead of Monday's last year," said Treasurer Dan Mackenzie.

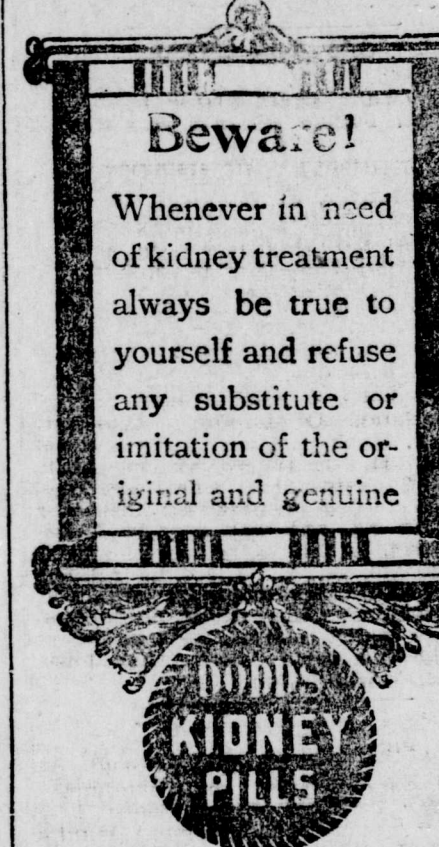
