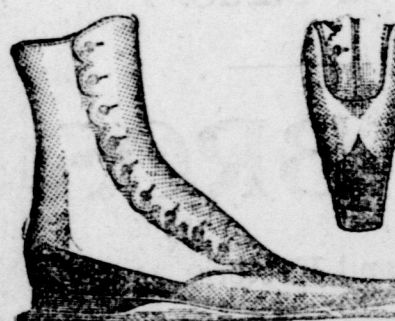

neighborhood, who will hear of his
death with regret, and condole with
his widow. Mr. Edward was a staunch
Liberal.

—The general drygoods, grocery and
hardware stock of W. W. Duncan,
Nilestown, were sold at auction by J.
W. Jones yesterday to W. Parkridge,
city. The stock was valued at \$763.50,
and the price paid was 44 cents on the
dollar. The store and lot of W. Dun-
can were also sold to Mr. Parkridge
for \$610.

—A number of very nervy tramps
have been imposing on the good nature
of London's citizens for several days
past. They make a specialty of calling
at the larger residences and soliciting
old clothes in return for any work they
can do, but when turned away with-
out an old coat or hat, they
pour out their abuse upon the house-
holder. Yesterday morning a poorly-
clad member of the fraternity called
at the residence of Mr. W. T. Edge,
corner of Dufferin avenue and William
streets, and after introducing himself
as "a man out of work," wanted to
know if there were any chores to do
around the premises. If there were,
he would be willing to do them as a
return for any clothing—hat or over-
coat—was given in return. Not a
word was said, and the stranger
showed how badly his topcoat was in
need of a rest or repairs. Mr. Edge
had no work for the man, but he gave
him a good overcoat, and received a
heap of thanks in return. Not a
word later Mr. Edge was on his way
to the city, and had hardly reached
the corner of Queen's avenue and Wil-
liam street when he was accosted by
the very same tramp who had called
at the house. "Good morning, doc-
tor," said the vag, as he braced him-
self against the fence and shivered,
as though suffering from the cold. Mr.
Edge suffered the man up, and at once
called him. "Before he had time
to answer the tramp broke in with:
"Ah! I mean professor; have you got
any old clothing to spare?" The ac-
cused could not see his overcoat, and
when he made himself known the im-
poster hurried towards Dundas street,
where he was joined by a pal. Numer-
ous other impositions have been re-
ported.

WALKS AND WAYS.

The Board of Works met last even-
ing, but transacted very little business
of importance. There were present:
Chairman W. Heaman, and Ald. Par-
nell, O'Meara, Nutkins, Callahan, John
Heaman, Engineer Graydon, Secretary
Bell and Commissioner Owens. A
communication from Macbeth & Mac-
pherson claiming damages for injury
sustained by a horse belonging to
O'Neill & Co., by stepping into a hole
in a bridge on Talbot street, was re-
ferred to the engineer and chairman
to report at the next meeting. The
matter of a deposit being made by
those who wish to tear up the asphalt
was referred to the engineer and
Chairman Heaman. Mr. Graydon was
also instructed to report whether there
is room for the drays to stand parallel
to the sidewalk on York street. Ald.
O'Meara claimed that the street rail-
way company were not properly lay-
ing the block pavement on Richmond
street. The engineer will see that the
road is left in proper shape. The con-
tract for painting the street bridge
was let to Fitzgerald Bros. for \$38, that
being the lowest tender. Ald. Parnell
moved that the engineer thoroughly in-
spect Victoria bridge and report on its
condition at the next meeting of the
committee. A number of accounts
passed.

Loudly praised as the band has been
throughout its tours, the Londoners
were to the Opera House expected
a rare musical treat, and they most
assuredly got more than they looked
for. The Chicago Marine Band is an
excellent organization, comprising be-
tween 40 and 50 members. It has as
conductor Mr. T. P. Brooke, and the
fruits of Mr. Brooke's training is a
well-balanced band, with exceptionally
fine reeds, and brass equal to that sec-
tion of any band which has ever played
in London. As a conductor, Mr.
Brooke has a manner which not only
pleases and gains the confidence of the
musicians in his charge, but the audi-
ence as well, and doubtless accounts
for his great success. Any attempt at
personal show is entirely avoided by
him; all he endeavors to do is to show
the band at its best. The programme
consisted of ten numbers by the band
and two solos by Minnie Methot, the
only lady traveling in connection with
the organization. Every number was
light and of the popular class, and
pleased so immensely that the audi-
ence were repeatedly demanded and cheer-
fully given in each instance. "The
March of the First," one of Mr.
Brooke's compositions, was the open-
ing number, and was worthy of the
place it held on the programme. In
response to an encore to the "Russian
Mazurka," the band gave Canada's
patriotic song, "The Maple Leaf," and
as the last verse was about completed
a huge Union Jack was dropped from
the flies and hung over the stage. The
audience vociferously applauded for
several minutes. "The Jolly Fellows,"
a humorous waltz, the ballet music
from "Faust," and the Mexican dance,
"Manzanillo," were given faultless in-
terpretations. "The Musicians' Strike"
was the most amusing number on the
long list, which was concluded with
the descriptive fantasia, "The Cavalry
Charge," making a fitting close to a
most enjoyable evening with the Chi-
cago Marine Band. Miss Methot, the
soloist, was on for two numbers—"Le
Seran Rose" and "I Heard a Song"—
and rendered both in a sweet, clear
soprano voice far above the average
heard on the stage. Those who missed
Brooke and his band missed one of the
best treats ever afforded London's
citizens.
