In the Canadian territory he traveled as far east as the Rocky Mountains, enduring great hardship, but exhilarated by the grandest scenery to be

The summit of Kicking Horse Pass is 2,000 feet above the level of the track on the plains to the east, and the up grade averages from 4 1-2 to 5 feet per hundred. Towering several thousand feet above the pass are the peaks of the surrounding mountains, which can be seen at a distance of 150 miles.

This section is rich in minerals. The C. P. R. take all their hard coal for western division from Canmore and the anthracite coal from McNeil's mines, both of which are in the immediate vicinity of the pass. The Monarch gold mine, in Mount Stephen, yields a large amount of ore, and little gold claims are springing up every-Stephen and Field are monumental mountains, the one being named after
