—The Aberdeens, of Ottawa, left for home at 4:30 this morning, via the C. P. R.

—Miss Tillie Moore, of Toronto, an ex-pupil of Harding Hall, is spending a few days at the residence of Mr. C. P. R.

—The city engineer has in contemplation the construction of a number of lateral sewers that work will commence on as soon as the weather allows. For several of these he already has plans drawn.

—The young woman giving the name of Emma Wright, who appeared in court yesterday, charged with disorderly conduct, is apparently a stranger here. Her name does not appear in the directory.

—The remains of the late Leon Bodkin, who was killed at Westminster, B. C., arrived here last night, and were taken to Ferguson's undertaking rooms. Many friends from Delaware came to the city to meet the remains.

—Duncan, the 14-year-old son of Thomas McLean, of con. 10, London township, died yesterday. The dead boy was known to many in the city. His father having formerly been a toll gate on Richmond street north.

—Tomorrow being Ash Wednesday, high mass will be celebrated at St. Peter's Cathedral at 10 a.m., followed by the distribution of the ashes. At 7:30 p.m. the first of the Lenten devotion services will be held. They will be continued Wednesday and Fridays throughout Lent.

—Miss Nellie B. Turner, the celebrated elocutionist, of Indianapolis, will assist the Quaker Male Quartet, of Philadelphia, in a concert to be given by them in the Dundas Central Methodist Church schoolroom tonight. An interesting and attractive programme has been prepared.

—St. Thomas Junior High School, the funeral of the late Mrs. Julia Regan, who died in London, took place from the L. E. and D. R. station to the Catholic Cemetery, Tuesday afternoon. The bearers were James Doyle, T. Coughlin, C. Regan, T. Coughlin, sen., J. O'Brien and J. Coughlin.

—The 22 days' mission in Memorial Church closed last night with a thanksgiving service. The congregation was largely increased, and gave expression of receiving definite blessing by receiving memorial cards. Mr. Murphy will commence a seven-days' mission in the same church, Sunday, after which he goes to Buffalo to conduct missions in that city.

—The special services, conducted afternoon and evening by Rev. W. H. ## LATIMER PLEADS GUILTY!

To Charges of Burglary Preferred Against Him.

Remanded for a Week for Sentence—Assault Case Withdrawn.

Vincent Latimer, the young man arrested a week ago for complicity in two robberies, was yesterday arraigned at the police court on two charges, one of breaking into and entering Donald McKenzie's shop and stealing therefrom goods to the value of \$50, and one of entering Charles Depper's store and taking therefrom one overcoat, a quantity of underwear, \$4 worth of stamps, and other articles, the total value being about \$25. The charges were read by Mr. J. H. Graydon, who pleaded not guilty, but after consulting with his counsel, Mr. H. M. Graydon, changed his plea to that of guilty. Mr. Graydon addressed the court at length, adducing a number of reasons why the magistrate should exercise considerable leniency in sentencing the prisoner. The prisoner's own statement is that he had only known his companion for a couple of days, and that it was the other man who had entered the buildings, and it was evident that the other man was the leader in both crimes. The prisoner, who is only 19 years of age, comes from a respectable family. He is a brain-finisher by trade, and Mr. Graydon produced certificates from employers in Toronto, with whom Latimer had worked for nearly a year up to Jan. 1, and this disposed of the theory that Latimer was one of a gang who have been working the country for months past. The prisoner's record was not very bad, he having been charged with vagrancy once, and with house-breaking once, and discharged both times. Mr. Graydon asked that a light sentence should satisfy the demands of justice. The police magistrate remanded the prisoner one week for sentence. The maximum punishment for the crime is fourteen years' imprisonment.

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## QUESTION OF THE PAY OF "C" COMPANY BROUGHT UP IN THE HOUSE.

Minister of Militia's Reply to Mr. Clark.

L. E. & D. R. Subsidy—Kingston Locomotive Contract—Other Matters Dealt With.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—From the fact that Monday is one of the days upon which precedence is given to private members, the ministers were kept busy for the first half-hour in answering questions upon various subjects in connection with the administration of public affairs. Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper made a vigorous speech in support of a motion for papers in connection with the consideration of government telegraph lines in the Klondike and Atlin districts, which was replied to with equal vigor by Mr. Tarte. Mr. Clark also brought up the question of pay of men of C Battery who served in South Africa.

Sir Louis Davies laid upon the table an order in council respecting the issue of licenses to United States fishing vessels under the act of 1887.

Mr. Blair also laid upon the table the report of the department of railways and canals.

Some score of questions upon the order paper were replied to by ministers.

Dr. Borden, replying to Mr. Bourassa, said that the Canadian officers who were engaged in the war in South Africa were not in permanent employment so far detailed as Capt. F. W. L. Moore, 4th Regiment Canadian Artillery, Second Lieut. C. B. Neill, 188th Infantry, and others.

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
