Toronto, April 10. — At the opening general meeting of the Ontario General Educational Association last night, Mrs. Ada Hughes, the president, made a vigorous address on the need for improved methods of education.

Mr. John Millar, the deputy minister of education, speaking unofficially, outlined a policy of educational reform.
