WEEKLY REVIEW.

LONDON, May 16, 1906.

The farmers and gardeners turned out in full force last week at the markets held here. The deliveries of the products of the farm and garden were large. Consequently there was more business transacted than in the previous week, notwithstanding the large increase in the supply of the smaller lines.

Grains—The supply of oats keeps pace with the demand. Prices rule at \$1 15 to \$1 17 per cwt. There is a considerable stock of oats in the farmers' hands. Wheat is firm at 80c per bushel.

Hay and Straw—From what can be learned from the most reliable sources, there is a genuine scarcity of hay. It was thought at one time that the farmers would not be able to find a market for their surplus stock of hay, but nearly all of the desirable stocks have been disposed of, and quite a number of the farmers are buying from their neighbors. The scarcity of hay is attributed to the fact that farmers have wintered an extra large number of cattle, and also owing to the grass being a week or so later than usual. Prices at present are \$9 50 to \$10 25 per ton. Straw is in fair demand at \$5 25 and \$5 50 per ton.

Butter and Eggs—Butter is a shade easier. Sales, however, are fairly brisk at 18c to 19c for pound rolls and 18c for cracks. Eggs are firmer in price. Prices are exceedingly brisk at 14c to 15c per dozen for crates and bushed lots.

Potatoes—Sales are quite brisk at 90c to \$1 per bag for seed potatoes, 20c to 25c being most frequently paid.

Apples—There is little or nothing doing in this line. Prices are steady at \$3 to \$4 per barrel or \$1 to \$1 50 per bag.

Dressed Hogs—Sales are fair at \$9 50 per cwt. for most of the offerings.

Live Hogs—Prices for last Monday's shipment was \$6 75 per cwt. The figures for next Monday could not be ascertained. Small pigs sell well at \$5 to \$5 25 per pair.

Poultry—There is not a great deal doing in this line. Spring chickens sell at 20c per pound alive and 20c dressed; by the pair, \$1 to \$1 25 dressed, or 90c per pair alive. Old fowl sell well at \$1 to \$1 40 dressed. Turkeys are lower at 12c to 14c for dressed birds.

Butcher's Meat—Beef is in fair demand at \$8 to \$8 25 per cwt. Veal, \$5 50 to \$7 50. Mutton is lower at 8c to 9c per pound. Lamb's, yearlings, 12c per pound. Pork, spring lambs, 6c to 6 50 per cwt. is asked.

Toronto, May 15.—The run at the city cattle market today was 62 loads, with 1,777 head of cattle, 55 sheep and lambs, 65 hogs and 25 calves.

The light run today affected the market, and prices held just about at last week's level, with a lower tendency at the close of the market. At the same time some good prices were paid for anything else, and some fairly well advanced export prices were asked for choice butchers' cattle sold at \$4 50 to \$4 75. While these prices show a slight advance, they are not a great deal higher than the prices for the same quality of cattle sold at the same time last week.

There would have been a druggery feeling in the butchers' market for the fact that there were a few buyers in from outside points, and these took away some of the best of the heavy cattle, weighing in the neighborhood of 1,500 lbs. and from this weight down to 1,000 lbs. The lot averaged \$4 45.

MR. BLAKE ILL IN COURT

The Eminent Toronto Lawyer Nearly Faints While Pleading.

Toronto, May 15.—Hon. S. H. Blake, K.C., collapsed in the court of appeal yesterday, while arguing in the famous habeas corpus case of McLean vs. Lawson.

His voice grew fainter and finally gave out. The strain of the argument had been too much for the veteran pleader, and his stomach became affected. Mr. Blake at once fainted, and had to be assisted out of court. He was then taken to his home.

Later he was reported to be much improved, and after a short rest he will resume his law practice. He is now over 70 years old, and in spite of that he is an indefatigable worker, continuing to plead before the high courts in important cases. The members of his firm say that he has been working too hard.

RACE WAR IN NEBRASKA

A Lynching Party of Whites Broken Up by Negro Soldiers.

Lincoln, Neb., May 15.—A dispatch from Crawford, Neb., says that four negro dealers in the riots between white men and negro soldiers from Fort Robinson. William Murphy, white, was killed at midnight by a squad of soldiers guarding the jail at Crawford. Murphy, with others, tried to form a lynching party to gain possession of the jail. SEVEN TORN TO PIECES

When Box of Dynamite Falls from Workman's Arms.

Shenandoah, Pa., May 15.—Seven men were torn to pieces and twelve badly burned by an explosion of dynamite in the Shenandoah City colliery of the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company today.

A box of dynamite which a workman was carrying fell from his shoulder and caused the explosion, which ignited the mine gas. All of the killed and injured were foreigners.
