WHY AUSTRALIA ENVIES CANADA.

While in some quarters in Canada there is an outcry against immigration, the commonwealth of Australia envies this country its good fortune, and is taking vigorous measures to divert the stream of British emigration to its own shores. The Australian correspondent of the London Times, under date of April 3, telegraphs as follows:

"In the House of Representatives, Mr. Deakin, Prime Minister of the commonwealth, speaking on the subject of immigration, emphasized the value of co-operation with the States. But, he said, if the approaching conference of premiers refused to act with the commonwealth, the latter would act alone. He believed that the people would support the commonwealth in the view that it was imperative to occupy and utilize the country and preserve it for the race and the flag. The next estimates, he continued, would contain proposals for introducing immigrants under the control in London of a high commissioner. The immigration would gradually increase in volume until the commonwealth was adequately peopled."

The Australian colonies for years have little encouragement to immigration. Some of their laws were actually hostile to newcomers from the mother country. One instance was the deportation by the New South Wales Government of six British hatters, engaged to work in the country, a case which aroused much indignation in Great Britain. As a result of restrictive and illiberal measures, British emigration to Australia, which at one time greatly exceeded that to Canada, steadily dwindled. Then began the great movement to this country. The population of Canada grew, while that of Australia stood still. The eyes of the British people turned to the Dominion. The politicians of Australia began to see their error, and a change of policy ensued. An immigration propaganda was set on foot in Great Britain by the various Australian colonies, now called states, acting independently, and their jealousy of Canada's success was shown by disparaging references to this country in their immigration literature. It is now proposed that the Federal Government of the commonwealth take up the work in which the states are separately engaged. Australia, like Canada, is too vast to be peopled by the natural increase of the population, and immigration is essential to the development of a great nation with a continent to subdue.

THE FAR NORTH COUNTRY.

As the development of the provinces west of the great lakes proceeds, and the vast prairies become wholly transformed into fertile farms, studied with thriving cities and towns, the interest of Canadians will turn to the great territory lying to the north of those provinces, the hinterland of Western Canada, the last west, as it has been called, which, there is reason to believe, is a country of great possibilities of development. Already a settlement has begun, cattle have been raised, wheat has been grown, trade has been carried on and mining development commenced in the nearer portion of that region lying north and west of Edmonton, and known as the Peace River country. Concerning the region beyond that, however, is a country known as the lower valley of the Athabaska River, and the Mackenzie River region, concerning which less is generally known. Some interesting information regarding this far northwestern country is furnished in the report of Mr. E. Stewart, superintendent of forestry, who last year made a trip down the Mackenzie River, which has just been issued by the interior department. Mr. Stewart reached Athabaska Landing, a hundred miles north of Edmonton, in June. The weather at that time he describes as warm and occasionally sultry, culminating in heavy showers, which were much needed for the grain. In the daytime the thermometer often registered 90 degrees in the shade. Farming had been carried on with marked success in the surrounding country for some time, one of the staple crops being wheat. On the trip down the river some good land was seen and much spruce timber, and some gas wells were passed. One of the latter was on fire, and for a distance of half an hour the roar of the burning and escaping gas could be heard. Extensive banks of tar sand containing twelve per cent of bitumen, which may be of commercial value when the region is reached by railway, were found along the lower valley of the Athabaska, and many

indications of petroleum were noticed, tar and deposits of asphalt appearing as far north as the Lower Mackenzie. Fort Providence, on the Mackenzie River, 917 miles from Athabaska Landing, was reached on July 15, and here were found peas, growing in the gardens, fit for use, potatoes in flower and other ordinary vegetables about as far advanced as they generally are a thousand miles further south.

Mr. Stewart speaks of the timber of the Mackenzie basin, and says the whole of the Arctic basin, except the barren banks of the far north and certain limited areas of the watersheds of the Athabaska and Peace Rivers, the latter being prairie, may be correctly described as forest land. It is computed that the watershed of the Mackenzie contains 451,000 square miles, and possesses great value in its fur-bearing animals.

Evidently this far north country is a land of much promise, whose development will begin in earnest as soon as the railroads push their way in.

AN INSULT TO VICE-ROYALTY.

The Whitney Government adds insult to injury by putting a lie on the lips of the Lieutenant-Governor. He was obliged to read the following passage in the prorogation speech, dictated by the ministry:

"I observe with satisfaction, the bill which you have passed respecting the representation of the people in the Legislative Assembly. The rapid increase in the population of the districts of New Ontario called for increased representation in the Legislative Assembly of that important part of the Province, while the partial redistribution of seats in the older sections has removed some of the anomalies and injustices which resulted from previous redistributions. A more complete redistribution of the constituencies, with a view of equalizing the representation in accordance with the population, should take place after the next decennial census. I am confident that the measure will commend itself to the people of the Province as fair and just and free from political partiality."

Of course these could not be the sentiments of a high-minded man like Sir Mortimer Clark. It was a contemptible act on the Government's part to compel him to use language revolting to his sense of honor. It looks like a deliberate attempt to humiliate him in reprisal for his refusal to extend the hospitality of Government House to the member for Manitoulin. The governor is not only placed in the position of defending the iniquity of the Whitney gerrymander, but of uttering purely partisan reflections, by condemning prior redistributions.

This is the first time since Confederation that an indignity of this kind has been placed upon anyone holding the vice-regal office, either at Ottawa or at any provincial capital. It is a scurvy trick, in keeping with the Whitney Government's seat-stealing legislation.

LAW REFORM CHLOROFORMED.
