



STATEMENT BY LEADER BORDEN SAYS HE WELCOMES APPEAL

Declares That Dissolution Was Unconstitutional But Hasn't Much to Say About Reciprocity.

Ottawa, July 30.—Mr. R. L. Borden, leader of the Opposition, gave out the following statement tonight:

"The dissolution of Parliament came as a great surprise to the supporters of the Administration. They evidently knew no more of the intention of the Government than they knew of the reciprocity agreement upon the 26th of January last. Apparently the Government decided upon dissolution in a hurry, or even in a panic, as they gave no intimation to the many members on both sides of the House who are accustomed to spend the week-end with their families, and who left for their homes on Friday night without receiving the courtesy of notice."

"The Conservative party welcomes an appeal to the people on the great issue which has been under discussion in Parliament. The President of the United States has more than once emphasized the fact that Canada is at the parting of the ways. These two ways lead in very divergent directions. The choice of the people will be fraught with momentous consequences to the future destiny of this country. It is right and just that they should consider the issue with their minds free from the influence of the Government's propaganda. The House of Commons, elected without any mandate on this question, ought not to reverse the policy of the past forty years without giving the people the right to speak. They declined to hasten the census, they delayed the redistribution, and finally they have dissolved Parliament at a moment's notice, without even asking the Opposition for the assent to the dissolution of the House of Commons until the next Parliament shall be enabled to grant the same."

"Constitutional authorities abound to prove that dissolution ought not to be granted without provision of the necessary supplies for the public service. We have been ready to grant such supplies, but the Prime Minister during the present session has refused to carry on the public service until the next Parliament shall be enabled to grant the same."

NO CEREMONY FOR DISSOLUTION

Eleventh Parliament Come to an End on Saturday.

FOUR PROCLAMATIONS

Conservative Supporters of Borden Believe Obstruction Tactics a Blunder.

Ottawa, July 30.—Four proclamations have been issued by His Excellency the Governor-General, the first proroguing and dissolving Parliament, the second fixing Sept. 14 for nominations and Sept. 21 for polling, the third making the writ returnable on Oct. 7, and the fourth calling Parliament for Oct. 11.

Ottawa, July 30.—This is the first time a session of Parliament has ever been closed without the appearance of the Governor-General in military state in the Senate chamber to give formal proclamation of the dissolution of the House of Commons, and was not due to reassemble until Aug. 5, and the summary method of dismissal had to be resorted to.

With over two years of its legal tenure of office to run, the eleventh Parliament of Canada has been dissolved—talked to death by a stubborn minority. The Government on Saturday morning, after a full meeting of the Cabinet council decided that any further attempt to pass the reciprocity agreement in the face of the frank and determined obstruction of the minority of the House of Commons was a waste of time. The Government decided to dissolve Parliament and to call a new Parliament for Oct. 11, and to fix Sept. 14 for nominations and Sept. 21 for polling.

It was a smiling and confident Prime Minister who met the members of the House of Commons at the conclusion of the Cabinet council session. "Gentlemen," he said, "Mr. Fielding has some news for you. It was characteristic of him to say that the Government would be dissolved on Saturday morning. The news spread like wildfire. Pressmen hurrying to telegraph offices were waylaid by the anxiously waiting members, who had been waiting for the word of the Government that the end had arrived. The news was passed from group to group in the Commons corridors, but it was not until the Prime Minister had spoken that the members began to move.

Police Think Attempt Was Made to Affect Her Testimony.

Richmond, Va., July 31.—Attorneys for the prosecution in the Battle case were disturbed today by a witness call. An attempt was made late this evening to affect the testimony of Beulah Binford, who is a witness against Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., charged with killing his wife.

Strict orders are in effect not to permit visitors to see the Binford girl, except members of her immediate family. Despite this, Detective Scherer this evening found the girl in earnest conversation with a heavily veiled woman, who rose hurriedly and attempted to leave when he entered the jail. Warden Garret said the young woman gained admittance as a "sister" of the prisoner.

Kicking and scratching the guards, the visitor was locked in another cell when the Binford girl was examined. Later the detective said that the young woman was an intimate friend of Beulah Binford and Henry Clay Beattie. He intimated that she confessed to having been sent to see Beulah in the interest of "certain papers" which she feared the revelations which will be forthcoming when she takes the stand.

According to the counsel on both sides, at least a score of young men and three women will be seriously compromised by Beulah's testimony.

Offers of marriage addressed to the 17-year-old "other woman" continue to arrive. Up to date she has received matrimonial tenders from eight men. One came today from Los Angeles. Another from New York addressed her as "My Poor Little Girl," recalled an acquaintance of three years ago, and coupled the proposal with the information that the writer was wealthy.

AMPLE FUNDS FOR WORKS, SALARIES

No Trouble Over Supply Until Parliament Meets—Borden Blocked Redistribution.

Ottawa, July 30.—In regard to Mr. Borden's argument as to the failure of the Government to ask for supply, it is quite sufficient answer to say that this whole matter has been very carefully considered by the Government, and a careful analysis of supply already granted shows that there are ample funds available to carry on the necessary public works now in progress and to pay civil service salaries until Parliament meets again.

After compelling dissolution without a redistribution bill, Mr. Borden now seeks to throw the onus upon the Government. He pleads his offer of April last to hurry up the census and bring in an early redistribution bill regardless of the fact that under the statute the census cannot be taken earlier than June 12, and that the figures would not be available as a basis for drafting a bill before October at the earliest. Experience of previous redistributions shows that it would take probably four or five months to put the bill through Parliament. That would mean that reciprocity would have to stand over until well on into next year. The Government takes the view that the vital issue now is to secure the benefit of reciprocity for this season's crops and to keep faith with President Taft, who has let nothing stand in the way of his part of the agreement. It is believed the West at present is much more concerned with security of reciprocity as speedily as possible than with securing a larger representation in the Commons, which will follow in due course as one of the first duties of the new Parliament.
