

ESTRANGING HINDOOS A SERIOUS MATTER

Dr. Sunder Singh Claims For 300,000,000 Rights of Other Britishers.

Toronto, Feb. 22.-Dr. Sunder Singh yesterday relented a little from his determination not to say anything in regard to Mr. H. H. Stevens' address before the Women's Canadian Club until he has been able to go carefully into the matter and prepare full statement. This morning he told his version of the story.
"There is no truth at all 'n the

slanderous statements made about me as the missionary of the Sikhs," said their leader. "I have been sent east as the envoy of my people in Canada, and they have shown that they trust me and indorse me by meeting in a great mass meeting, which comprised nearly the total Hindoo population of Vancouver, on the 30th day of last steps I had already taken in their behalf. My credentials, so scathingly attacked by Mr. Stevens, are in good order, and consist in the indorsation whole Hindu population of

Titles of the Lots. "He has said that the titles of lots

belonging to other members of the Hindoo community were held in my name. That is not so, the titles of the lots owned by different members of our community are in the names the owners. When I landed in Vancouver three years ago I had some money of my own and bought some lots, and it is these lots which are in my own name. What the Vancouver member has said about this cannot be true. They have the British law out in British Columbia, and if he believes have wronged my brother Hindoos he can have recourse to the courts. I am not running away, but am showing myself openly. So far the Hindoos have not complained of me, but have unanimously indorsed the work I have already done for them.

"As regards his statement about my negotiating with a transportation company in Toronto with a view to bringing in a colony of Sikhs from Calcutta to some place in Eastern Canada, there is not a particle of truth in it. I am here in Toronto simply trying to place before Canada our side of the question.

FALLS ON EVIL DAYS

Syndicate of the Kaiser's Intimates Under Official Investigation.

Berlin, Feb. 22.—Germany's famous 'Princes' Trust," the heads of which are the Kaiser's intimates, Princes Furstenberg and Hohenlohe, seems to have faller into difficulties. The trust's enterprise include banks like the Bank of Palestine loan and building societies, steamship lines, melting works, potash mines, the Hotel Esplanade and Wertheim's store in Berlin. The aggregate capital exceeds \$100,000,000.

Shares in the Berlin Land and Building Company have fallen this year from 150 to 25; it is alleged that there has been mismanagement of the Hohenlohe Smelt ing Works, and it is admitted that ther ls a necessity for an increase of \$10,000, 000 in the capital stock. A store, two theatres and other concerns owned by th trust are practically bankrupt. A clea statement of the position of the trust will be impossible before a fortnight. Mean-

> Operators Indifferent. But the principal complaint is that the operators are indifferent to the desires of patrons. The alleged indifference is attributed directly to Government ownerhip. With the taking over of the private ines the Government added about 18,000 employees to its civil service list. These

These employees are practically assured of life service with a pension on retirement, and it is contended that the satisfaction derived from the contemplation of this condition has made many of them believe that there is no occasion to worry over the requirements of the public.

At any rate, there is a growing discontinuous condition. Before obtaining a monopoly of the telephone lines in the United Kingdom the postoffice operated an extensive telephone service in competition with the National Telephone Company, which controlled all the private telephones. It has been asserted that this company gave trolled all the private telephones. It has been asserted that this company gave much better service than the postoffice, against which the charge of indifference to its obligations to telephone patrons was pending long before it was accentuated by the increase in its field of operations. The Pall Mall Gazette puts the situation briefly thus:

"The telephone betrays many secrets, but not more completely than in glving away the case for state ownership. A week ago we raised a protest against the sudden demoralization of the system, and called for evidence. Now there is a chorus of complaint and remonstrance all
