Boston Braves To Have Grounds Like Yale Bowl

One-Story Stands To Hold 45,000 People Will Be Built.

BOSTON, Dec. 16.—One-story stands, capable of seating approximately 45,000 spectators, will be built at the Boston National League club's new baseball park in the Allston district. In making public his plans today President James E. Gaffney sald the grounds would be constructed something after the manner of the Yale Bowl. The base of the stands will be placed twelve feet below the street level, making it post at some future date to add anothe story and not have it too high above the playing ground. Mr. Gaffney said the time was coming when a double deck stand capable of seating 60,000 persons would be needed. The entire stands, including the bleachers, will be of cement.

Mr. Gaffney had assurances from President J. J. Lannin, of the American League club, that the Braves will be allowed the use of Fenway Park until the new plant is ready.

It is expected that construction will be finished about July 4. The playing field will be larger than that of Fenway Park.






