Mix With Cement For Foundation, Says Dodd-After New Wage Scale.

So many matters pertaining to garbage and garbage collection came up at the meeting of No. 3 committee last evening that in order that other business should not be delayed, the aldermen decided to hold a special "garbage night" to try and settle the various

Superintendent Walter Dodd wants a bylaw passed forcing householders to provide proper receptacles for their garbage and ashes. If this were done, he said, the collection could be made much more easily and at far less cost. Ale and Porter He cited many instances where the ashes are piled in the yards, and where gardage and asnes are not out for collection. When the matter is not taken away, complaints pour in, and in many cases, he claimed, after personal investigation, he found them entirely un-

day, will be discussed at length later. At the present time ail the men receive \$2 per day Superintendent Dodd reported that, in his opinion, tons of clinker from the ininerator, now being used to strengthen
