This year's repre-sentations are of specially wide interest in view of the provisions of the treaty of Versailles, and of the part played by the Dominion Government delegates at the International Labor Conference at Washington. The delegation was headed by Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress. The chief re-

3. Elimination of any system whatever of bonusing for industria Cause of Strikes.

"The efforts to establish this shorter work day and week, and an adequate wage have been the most fruitful cause of sirikes.

"The justice of the claim for a maximum 8-hour day is recognized in the treaty of peace to which Canada is a signatory."
