Only two railroad men and one commercial traveler voted at the special referendum poll in the office of the first division court Thursday night. It was estimated that 300 persons expecting to be out of town on Monday would find it convenient to vote on one of the advance polling nights, but only three votes were cast last night.

APATHY TO GENUINE REFORM, GREATEST PERIL OF PRESENT

Henry Ledyard Says Winnipeg Strike Engineered From Detroit Village.

DIVINE RIGHT OF KINGS

Idea of Royal and Class Privileges Developed in Asia.

"You hear much of the rights of citizenship, but you hear little of its duties," said Henry Ledyard, the Detroit barrister, who addressed the members' council of London Chamber of Commerce at dinner in the Tecumseh House last night. Mr. Ledyard's subject was "The Obligations of Citizenship," and owing to the recent formation within the Local Council of Women of a "Citizenship Committee," a number of women were present by special invitation.

Col. W. J. Brown, chairman of the members' committee, occupied the chair and briefly introduced the speaker of the evening.

Mr. Ledyard said that he felt in coming before Canadians that he was appearing before his own people. He quoted Sir Auckland Geddes, the British ambassador at Washington, as saying that the age of man in Europe as he appears in his later development is no less than 250,000 years, and said that the same authority claimed a minimum descent for man of not less

than 1,000,000 years. During all these years, said the speaker, man had been striving to establish the principles of good government, but the recent great war, and the mess that remained after it, had shown that this effort had resulted in failure.

Rise of Theocracy.
Mr. Ledyard then traced the rise of Theocracy in the Asiatic countries, and pointed out that from this idea arose the theory of the divine right of kings and the original of the so-called privileged classes. But in the early ages of civilization there sprung up in North-western Europe an idea that the people were the mouthpieces of the Almighty, and this was the beginning of democracy. Those races carried this idea with them over to England, and Magna Charta and other historic manifestations of the will of the people were the result. England sent forth men trained in these ideas to the colonies and the American constitution was one of its glorious consequences.

"And now the Anglo-Saxon race has become the sheet anchor of a storm-tossed world," declared Mr. Ledyard, "and not all the dreams of a League of Nations can take the place of Anglo-Saxon unity, and it has been brought out by this recent war that never again will Anglo-Saxon fight Anglo-Saxon. The English, the Americans, the Canadians, the Australians, and the South Africans constitute the reserve forces that are the mainstay of civilization. But that civilization is now in danger. We have now anarchy, unrest, Bolshevism and other similar elements all fighting on our Anglo-Saxon civilization."

Closed Shop Discussed.
The speaker said that he had heard a trades union leader, with a mentality about equal to that of a medieval robber baron, once declare that those who opposed the "closed shop" were the enemies of civilization, and he had heard a bishop, the church use the same name effect. The recent revolutionary movement in Winnipeg was engineered from a village within the municipality of Detroit. There were men today who were pledged to destroy all those rights of citizenship which the Anglo-Saxon race held dear. They declared in substance: "I hate your God; I hate your religion; I hate your Government."

"There is a call in our civilization to fight all this," he said, "and it is a call that is being very poorly met." Mr. Ledyard then went on to say that which patriotism has inspired in the late war, the call of the obligations of citizenship was one that was now being neglected. One heard much of the rights of citizenship, but very little of its duties. "Bolshevism, anarchy and unrest are not the greatest perils that confront us today," he said, "but that apathy in carrying through any propaganda for the good of the people. Any well-organized Bolshevist minority will overcome an apathetic majority."

More Interest Needed.
"A government is no greater than the people who sustain it," continued Mr. Ledyard, "and you are unworthy of your glorious Anglo-Saxon inheritance unless you carry the principles it includes into your daily life. We must take an active, devoted and unselfish interest in our government, in our city, and in all that constitutes good citizenship, or the men who are opposed to these things are bound to win, and the precious inheritance which has been handed down to us will be lost. The most divine form of government, that of democracy, every institution that has been established for the good of mankind, is in danger of being swamped in this flood of dissatisfaction and unrest. We must see to it that this golden heritage of government does not by our indifference and neglect perish from the earth."

On the motion of Major T. J. Murphy, seconded by J. J. Vining, the speaker was awarded an enthusiastic vote of thanks for his address.

At the outset of the proceedings the toast to the King was given from the chair, and the toast of "Uncle Sam" was also drunk and was responded to by G. R. McTaggart, American consul.

In the course of the evening a splendid musical program was submitted, vocal solos being artistically contributed by Mrs. Ed Wyatt and Harry Carson. Marjorie Talbot of the London Institute of Musical Art acted as accompanist.

BIBLE SOCIETY AN ESSENTIAL UNIT OF CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Dr. Cooper, Toronto Speaker, Urges Larger Support For Organization.

That the Bible Society is as necessary to the Christian church as the railroad bed is to the railway company, was the statement of Dr. Cooper of Toronto, general secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, at a banquet held in his honor in the Congregational Church on Thursday evening. The meeting, composed of the board and delegates of the local society, was very enthusiastic, and the needs of the Bible Society, following the war, were placed before the ministers and others in a most compact way. The dire need for the Bible in Russia, Italy and other European countries, the speaker said, was most urgent. The Bible Society in England had called for help, and had been sent a generous amount of several thousand dollars, and more would be sent later, Dr. Cooper said.

London gave \$300 for the year and has gradually increased that amount, until last year \$3,600 was given by London city. Of this amount \$1,000 was a legacy to the society. It was decided by the board at last night's meeting to arrange some systematic way for the city to contribute to this worthy fund, and the fourth Sunday in October was named as the campaign day. Dr. Cooper went into detail regarding the finances and work of the Bible Society, and after his address the London members voted that London must make a record this year in its contribution.

Certificate Received.
At the business meeting held prior to the banquet it was announced that John I. A. Hunt of this city was receiving a certificate from the British and Foreign Bible Society in England. Only two other Canadian societies have been honored in this way. Principal C. C. Waller, the president, occupied the chair, and tendered a vote of thanks to the ladies of the Congregational Church and to Rev. Matthew Kelly, for the banquet.

C. O. F. DIRECTORS MEET.

At a meeting of the directors of the London Chamber of Commerce, held on Thursday afternoon, reports were received regarding the proposed sports arena, the Theodore Roosevelt Highway Association, and the agricultural council. A report was also submitted regarding town-planning legislation, and it transpired that the procedure to be adopted is to ask the approval of the legislative committee to bring in a report next session.
