considered quite resistant to the avian type of tubercle bacilli, the chances of infection are doubtless slight.

In Several Ways.

Tuberculosis may be introduced on a farm in several ways, such as receiving infected fowls, exposure to neighboring infected fowls using same range, infection of premises by free-flying birds, carriers, such as man or animals, whose shoes or feet may carry infected droppings from near-by infected farms. Most eggs harboring the organism fail to hatch, thereby reducing to a minimum the danger of infection from this source, but if infected eggs are thrown to the chickens the disease may be established in the flock.

Although birds may become infected at any age, the disease is not readily detected by ordinary observation in those under one year old, because months are required for the bacilli to multiply in the system sufficiently to interfere with the normal functioning of the body. The older fowls, from two to three years old, are most likely to display symptoms and show a high death rate.

Start to Get Thin.

One of the first symptoms is gradual emaciation, which becomes especially noticeable in the breast muscles. These diminish in size until in advanced stages there is scarcely any flesh left on the breast bone. Feeding the breast region will readily detect the wasting. The appetite continues good. Lameness in one or both legs, or drooping of one or both wings, is another symptom.

The bulletin mentioned describes these and other symptoms at length. Paleness of comb, wattles, skin on the head and about the eyes is evidence of the last stages. A skilled operator can apply the intradermic tuberculin tests to detect the presence of the disease, but medical treatment for fowls is futile. Preventive measures, the most usual being slaughtering, are the wisest.

POTATO CROP IN ONTARIO DISAPPOINTING

But Root Crops and Pastures Have Improved Since the Rainfall.

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the head office of the Bank of Montreal from its branch managers: **Prairie Provinces.** Edmonton district—For a large percentage of the wheat crop there are no reports of damage. Out crop promises good yield. Calgary—Conditions still favorable for cutting, which is about half done. Fair average yield.

DAUGHTER OF FOWLS IS MORE WIDESPREAD THAN USUALLY IMAGINED.

Tuberculosis in fowls is more widely shown by far the highest mortality from the disease is generally supposed. It is especially destructive in flocks in the north and west. The course of the disease is slow; symptoms are apparent only in the late stages, and the mortality is high. The danger to man, however, is slight, especially since cooking the flesh of fowls destroys the tubercle bacilli. Treatment of fowls affected is declared to be useless, but the disease may be stamped out by methods described in Farmers' Bulletin No. 1200, issued by the United States Department of Agriculture.

High Mortality.

Of all domesticated birds, the fowl shows by far the highest mortality from tuberculosis. The disease has spread so extensively in some states as to cause very serious losses to the poultry industry. The insidious manner of attack makes it more difficult to combat, because affected birds show no visible symptoms until the disease processes are far advanced, and in the meantime it has been communicated to others of the flock.

Avian tuberculosis, as it is sometimes called, is caused by a micro-organism closely resembling the bacilli of human and bovine tuberculosis. While, primarily, it affects birds, it may also attack animals. First exposed to tuberculosis flocks frequently are affected and display localized tubercles in the lymph glands of the head, neck and mesenteric. Rats and mice also may contract the disease naturally. Bacilli of an avian type have been found in tuberculous persons. The principal danger to humans is in eating raw eggs from tuberculous fowls, as eggs may be infected with the bacilli. However, as man is

Lethbridge—Fifty per cent wheat out.

Threshing under way in some districts in the northeast and west; the returns are disappointing.

The south reports good yield. Late rains have profited by recent showers. Plenty of feed in southern districts. Others short. Saskatchewan—With continuation of present good harvest weather, 60 per cent wheat will be cut by 27th. Seventy central points report all conditions favorable, with high-grade wheat expected, and yield ranging from 20 to 30 bushels. Regina—Weather conditions ideal. Wheat cutting partly completed and threshing started. Returns satisfactory. Other grain good crop.

Winnipeg—Grains practically all cut and threshing well advanced. Average wheat yield 15 bushels. Early marketing expected.

Quebec and Ontario.

Harvesting is practically completed in many districts and reports indicate that the cereal crop generally is light. Probably 60 per cent to 70 per cent of average. Root crops and grass pastures have improved by recent rains. The yield of potatoes will be light. Corn is disappointing. Peaches are light. Pears good. Apples a poor crop on the whole. Second growth of hay is showing to advantage.

Maritime Provinces.

Harvesting operations are well under way, but prospects point to a light crop of all cereals. While crops have been benefited by recent rains, they are not expected to produce average yield. Grass pastures show improvement owing to recent rainfall. Apples are expected to be a fair crop. In Prince Edward Island, recent rains have proved very beneficial to all crops, especially potatoes, and a fair yield may be expected. Grass pastures show a decided improvement.

Western Provinces.

More or less heavy and beneficial rains have fallen throughout the province, with the exception of Ashcroft and Nicola districts, where rain is badly needed. Reports indicate grains will be a good average crop. So far not adversely affected by rain. Roots are only fair and potatoes will not exceed the 80 per cent crop. In Okanagan district apples may now exceed the 1919 output. Early varieties are over-running estimates. Pears are 15 per cent over 1919. Stone fruits are average. In other districts tree fruits are poor to average. Pastureage is only fair, but is improving in some districts.
