3,000 Methodists Bare Bowed Heads in Demonstration at Detroit.

LAUD RULE OF BRITAIN

Urge Speedy Aid for Stricken Europe and Indian Ideals.

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 16.—Three thousand Methodists, in national conference in Central M. E. Church, adjourned Wednesday noon to Grand Circus Park, and with bowed heads and later with exultant voices, enacted "The Flaming Cross—A Demonstration."

Hymns of Methodism filled the fall air for blocks with song led by the pastor of a precursor standing in the shadow of the new Russell A. Alger memorial here.

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veying the gospel to very inhabited corner of the globe.

The delegates during the morning had listened to five of the church's greatest figures who declared that Europe must not be deserted in the present crisis and allowed to stew in its own juice, that India must have leaders to finish the job of leading its aspirations to the light, and that the world never needed the church one-half as much as it does today.

Listen in Silence.

They listened in awed silence to messages from the frontiers of civilization urging the church not to falter in its task and to continue its mission and spiritually torn world.

"Nothing could be as short-sighted as the policy of 'forget Europe.' We have done enough," declared Bishop Edgar Blake, the church's chief in Paris, capital of a diocese that includes all of continental Europe and part of Northern Africa.

"Our sons went gladly to war. We cannot neglect the soil which their blood has consecrated. With all our resources, without hesitation and without reservation, we must go to Europe's aid. We found our soul in war, let us not lose it in peace."

See Peace in India.

"There will be no serious revolt in India," declared Bishop H. Lester Smith, former pastor of the church in India, with a diocese capital in Bangalore.

"Ghandi's movement is not a violent affair. The British have provided a generous government of home rule which has brought social, economic, intellectual and spiritual enlightenment to India is the Christian faith and education that grows out of the Christian attitude toward the individual and the worth of personality."

The western world must come to the aid of India and come quickly. Indian life is fluid this minute. We must provide the men today to line up the details which ought to shape the India of tomorrow."

Rev. E. D. Soper Speaks.

"In contrast with the religions of the Near and Far East we have Christianity whose essential doctrine is that we find Christ, that we know the kind of God with whom we have to deal," was the keynote of the first address of the morning, delivered by the Rev. Edmund D. Soper, professor of the history of religions in Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill.

The speaker declared that Christianity is capable of becoming a world religion because it is adequate, because man is constantly seeking God and that through Christ he finds the answer to that longing and aspiration.

Wednesday's was the fourth in a series of five sessions to account for the stewardship of the church in disposing of half of the \$118,000,000 fund for missionary, educational and benevolent work raised two years ago, and to plan, with the assistance of the experience gained, to extract full value from the remainder in spreading the word throughout the church's parish, the entire globe.

MURDOCK RAPS TORY "THEFTS"

Declares That Meighen Has Evolved 11th Commandment of His Own.

SPEAKS AT BRANTFORD

BRANTFORD, Nov. 16.—James Murdock, former labor representative on the board of commerce, and W. T. R. Preston of Durham were the principal speakers at a rally in the armories here tonight in the interests of W. G. Raymond, Liberal candidate in Brantford.

Mr. Murdock dealt at length with his connection with the board of commerce, charging that members of the cabinet blocked the workings of the board, making it useless for the carrying on of its investigation.

The Conservative government, backed up by the big interests, the speaker said, did not want the investigations carried out, and it appeared to him that Premier Meighen's eleventh commandment was "Thou shalt not prevent our friends from stealing or prevent them from exploiting the people in their distress."

The tariff, as it stood at the present time, Mr. Murdock continued, put the greatest burden on the working people of Canada. The tariff, however, was not the only issue, he said, for the people wanted to know about the national railways. Information on that point had not been forthcoming in Canada, nor about unemployment, brought about by the big interests behind the Conservative party to crush labor.

As a labor man, Mr. Murdock said he did not believe in class government, and he appealed to labor men to support the Liberal party, which was big enough to include all classes.

W. T. R. Preston charged ballot stuffing, ballot switching in the overseas soldier voting, and declared that men who had voted Liberal had been drafted from non-fighting regiments and hurried to the trenches, which, when protest was made as to evidence coming out, one colonel had callously replied: "Half the evidence will be buried in Flanders."

N. C. O's and men who dared to act as scrutineers took their very lives in their hands and were ejected from the booths. Promises to the soldiers in the hospitals, the farmers, as to relief if the union government were returned to power had been ruthlessly broken.

The announcement that Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King would speak here later was received with cheers.

There was an audience of over 2,000 men and women workers present, and the keenest enthusiasm was shown. The speakers were given every encouragement by the cheering and applause of their hearers.

Mr. W. G. Raymond, the party candidate reiterated his election policy, including a tariff for revenue purposes.

Mr. Roy Searge, a well-known manufacturer, presided.

At Paris the afternoon Mr. Murdock was awarded a reception by several hundred of the supporters of Mr. Robert Aiken, Liberal candidate in Brantford.

KILLS WIFE IN GUN ACCIDENT IN HOME

Major Pelletier Victim of Revolver Explosion Tragedy.

QUEBEC, Nov. 16.—(By Canadian Press).—Mrs. Victor Pelletier, wife of Major Victor Pelletier, was shot and killed at her home, 173 Grande Allee, at 5:30 o'clock this afternoon by the accidental discharge of a revolver in the hands of her husband.

Major Pelletier, who is widely known throughout Canada, was formerly aide-de-camp to four lieutenant-governors.

He resigned from the service about three years ago to accept the position of superintendent of the parliament buildings.

Being no longer in the military service, he recently closed a deal with a firm in Montreal to sell his uniforms and other military equipment and was in this act this afternoon of packing up these articles for shipment when the accident happened.

Among the equipment was a .32-calibre revolver.

Major Pelletier removed the cartridges from the gun, but in doing so he overlooked one chamber and was pointing the revolver towards the wall and pressing the trigger to see that the gun was in good order when his wife passed in front of him.

At that instant the hammer came in contact with the cartridge and the gun discharged, the bullet entering Mrs. Pelletier's back on the left side and piercing her heart.

She uttered a scream as she fell dead.

KING TO CONCLUDE MEETINGS IN WEST

SWIFT CURRENT, Sask., Nov. 16.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, arrived here today on his way to Regina, where he is to address a meeting this evening. Tomorrow afternoon Mr. King will address a meeting at Moose Jaw, which will conclude his series of Western meetings.

The Liberal leader will then go to Winnipeg, proceeding from there to Hallock, Ont., where he speaks on Saturday evening, afterwards going to his own constituency of North York, where he will address a meeting at Newmarket, Ont., on nomination day.

Little Drops an Ocean Make, Subtitled Photoplay

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—No element in the presentation of a photoplay has so potential a reaction upon an audience as the subtitle.

The subtitle is more than an element of presentation. So far, the director has been unable to tell his story without subtitle. Charles Ray's "The Old Swimmin' Hole" and Hugo Ballin's "The Journey's End" are the only exceptions to that.

Being unable to dispense with subtitles, directors are more and more turning their attention to secure the best talent to write them.

This writer believes Grantland Rice's subtitles to his sport pictures are the best on the screen. They play upon the imagination. They build a more vivid picture than the action of the film. They enhance the story told in the part of the film which follows the subtitle.

The subtitles of the Bruce scenes, indeed, of all the screen scenes, are high examples of writing craftsmanship.

Rupert Hughes, undoubtedly, is the most cryptic title writer for feature photoplays. He holds the advantage of writing titles for his own stories, having the evolution of the plot entirely within his own mind he supplies in written words exactly what is lacking in action or atmosphere in the filmed scenes. Thus, pictures which Hughes supervises present a complete unity of narration.

John Emerson and Anita Loos were the first to recognize the importance of title writing and to capitalize on it. Jointly they have made successes of films that without their subtitles would have proven failures. Their work possesses much of the same merit as that of Hughes. However, it is comparable to broth prepared by two cooks as tasted with that prepared by one cook.

Will Rogers achieved success on the stage by his ability to condense humor into snappy epigrams. When he points

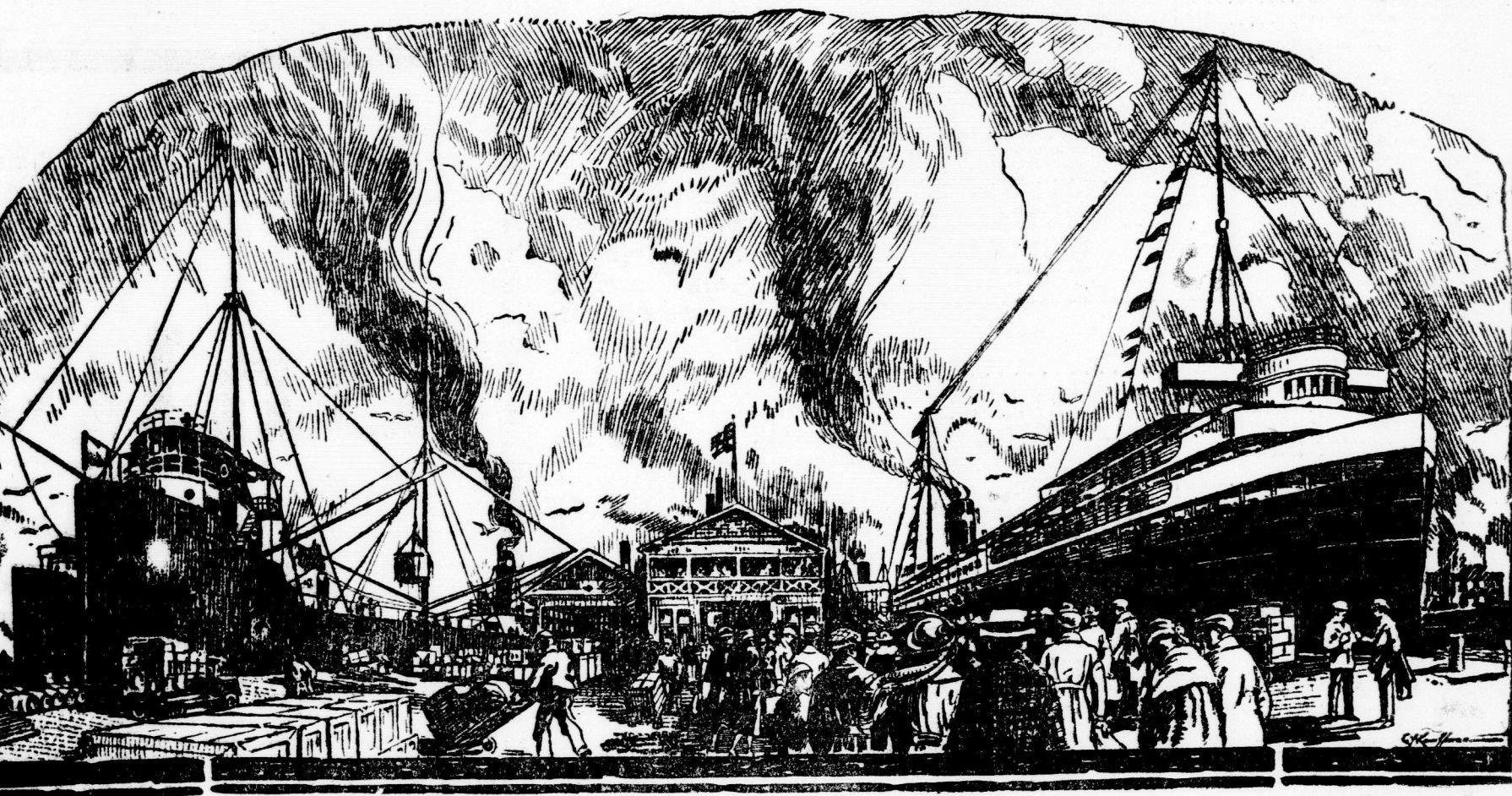


MADGE BELLAMY. She's 19, a daughter of a college professor and featured in "Hail the Woman."
