CABINET LAUDS **WORK AT PARLEY**

French Delegation Praised For Work at International Conference.

HERRIOT CHEERED

Associated Press Despatch. Paris, Aug. 19 .- The French cabinet today unanimously approved the work of the French delegation at the international conference in London. and thanked it for the important results it had attained in the interests of France. The cabinet met this morning, and after having listened attentively to a report by Premier Herriot on the proceedings and results of the conference, gave its un-

qualified approva; to the accords which had been concluded at the lengthy meeting at the British capital.

It was decided that the premier should read his declaration before the senate and chamber of deputies on senate and chamber of deputies on Thursday, giving a complete resume of the work of the conference to both bodies of the legislature.

Meantime the ministers will attack an important problem of internal policy, meeting this evening to consider measures connected with the high cost of living, notably, in re-gard to the price of bread.

The cordial reception accorded M.
Herriot this morning by his colleagues of the cabinet echoed the enthusiasm of the vast throngs of men and women who came to greet him when he arrived from London ves-

terday evening.

The popular demonstration in and about the St. Lazare station when the premier arrived, was an unmistakeable expression of popular rejoicing over the accord concluded in London, but it was also, in the opinion of observers a personal tribute to M. Herriot.

The approval given by the cabinet this morning to the work of the French delegation in London is said by competent observers to augur well for the survival of M. Herriot's report through the two or three weeks of parliamentary buffeting it will





BIG FUTURE SEEN FOR CLAY BELT

Sir John Russell, Noted British Agriculturist, Tours North Country.

GREATLY SURPRISED

Canadian Press Despatch. Cochrane, Ont., Aug. 19.-Agricultural development will take place in the clay belt to the north of Cobalt, in the opinion of Sir John Russell, director of the Rothamstead agricultural experimental station of Great Britain and a prominent agriculturist, who discussed the prospects of this territory, comprising an area of 1,200 square miles with the Canadian Press representative on board the

British Association special train. Accompanied by a score of agricultural experts, Sir John Russell, who is president of the agricultural section of the British Association motored through the district yesterday and inspected. motored through the district yester-day and inspected the government experimental farm at New Liskeard, where grains are being developed specially suited to this area.

"It was a surprise to most of us to find such a big strip of agricultural land so far north," Sir John said.
"The area is of good-quality loam and sub-soil, and there is a good proportion of lime.
