With a bare minute and a half score of 30 minutes overtime, and the count knotted up at 4-4, Lowery, right on top of the defense, passed to Bellefeuille, who, in turn, passed to the striding Doherty, and looked in the winning counter which broke the Stratford jinx and the hysterical tension at which nearly 4,000 fans were held from the start of the third period on.

If Jerry had been only thinking of Lowery, he could have shot the puck himself. Loyalty to the sport and to his team made him push aside the honor of scoring the vital tally in the most thrilling game London has seen.

"Bellefeuille the Cool" would describe Pierre as he eased the rubber past Doherty. It was surely a tough break for Stratford that Frank Carson had to be chased to the stocks when the battle was at its grimmest.

But the 75's were often left with a man short. Doggedness is the answer. "They Shall Not Pass" was the motto, and Carson's journey to the London goal were just as tough as Verdun.

There is no fault to find with Dr. Bill's performance last night. The wiry, little, tough-headed Indian was a batter all the time, and he was the pivot of most of the visitors' onslaughts.

Here's to Doherty too. As a guardian of the crossed strings he has few peers. His work was unannounced perfect at times. But the fatal scramble around his stronghold especially with Lowery with his eyes on the puck, was through the waiting London defense.

Renard too was winning fame. True, he did not bat away as many shots, but his judgment made a powerful impression on the fans.

It wouldn't be an awful surprise if Leamy could play a good game blindfolded. That gigantic nose guard reduced his vision half strength, but he was in the fray all the time and travelling as fast as the pacemaker.

Smythe was master of the situation at all times and at no period could any call to mix rough. His reflexes satisfied the great majority.

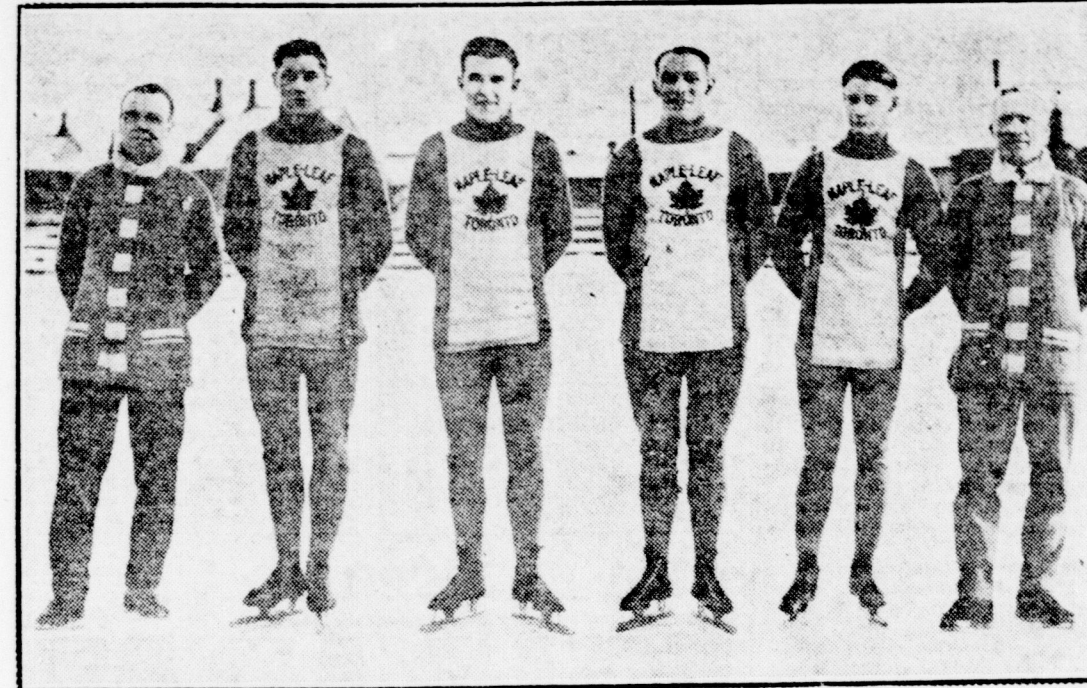
