Wheat and Flour-A Crisis of Decision We have come to a crisis of decision on a great question. The question of fair play to the agricultural interest of Canada is one of the most important that can engage as it is at all times, however, it is rapidly becoming urgent, as they say in the French chamber of deputies-in fact one of the burning questions of the day. How this is coming about we can easily see, if we do but pay attention to certain facts which everybody knows, but which very few properly consider. For twelve years -1854 to 1866-grain and other natural products crossed the border both ways free of duty, which we believed to be just as fair for one side as it was for the other. But our neighbors, for reasons of their own, saw fit to give notice of termination of Lord Elgin's reciprocity end in March, 1866. The year before that, Sir Alexander Galt and Sir William P. Howland had been in Washington, trying to obtain a new arrangement or an extension of the old one, but could not move the American authorities from their unfriendly determination. The late Hon. George Brown, for some time a member of the confederation coalition cabinet, resigned and stepped out, for the reason chiefly that he wanted to go to Washington on that very business himself, but had been passed over by Sir John. In 1874, a reform government being then in power, his turn came, and he too "tried it on" at Washington, but with no better success. 
