DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT INWOOD

Fire of an unknown origin broke out in the garage and electric light plant at Inwood on Friday night last and the structures were completely destroyed. When the fire was first discovered, about 11.30, it had gained great headway and as the building was of frame construction it was quickly consumed by the flames. The light plant was in a room off the garage and it is also totally destroyed. In the garage were three Ford cars, together with other engines and machines which were in for repair and it was impossible to get them out of the building. We understand there was some insurance on the plant and building, but above that Mr. Johnston's loss will be in the neighborhood of \$2,500, while to the village in the loss of their lighting plant, about \$2,000. The blacksmith shop alongside was also badly scorched, one end especially being very badly burned. Had it not been for the fact that a large number of farmers were in town that night at a meeting of the U.F.O., Inwood might not have been standing today. The wind was in a right direction to wipe out the street, and it required no little effort on the part of hundreds of men to keep it under control.—Free Press.

BOSANQUET COUNCIL

Council met on the 3rd inst. All the members present. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. A by-law submitting to the ratepayers of Grand Bend police village the question as to whether they are in favor of hydro-electric power was adopted.

A petition was presented by F. Melville and others asking the council to have the Canada Co. canal repaired under The Municipal Drainage Act. Filed.

Middleton, \$37.50 freight on tile for Spearman and Donald drains; D. Weir, \$1.68 refund of taxes on s w pt lot 8, con. C, it having been twice assessed; Nial Eastman \$4 and Ed. Dobbie \$4 drawing tile for Spearman drain; Walter Bell \$7 drawing tile for Donald drain; Coultis & San \$42.90 for plank; Crawford & Co., \$8.00, supplies for Mrs. Gerouard.

Council adjourned to meet on Monday, the 31st day of May, at 10 a.m., as a court of revision on the assessment roll and for general business.

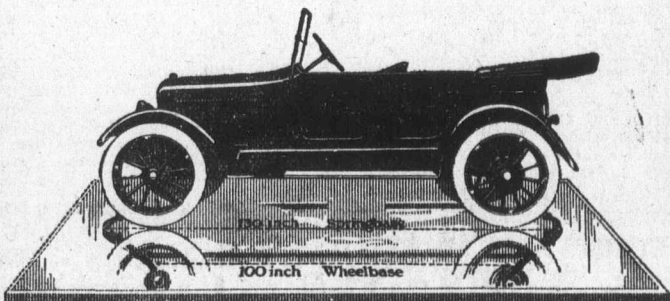
