FOUR MORE RESIGNATIONS IN FOREST COUNCIL

A PEST OF WALNUT TREES

The Entomological Branch of the Department of Agriculture has just issued circular No. 21, entitled "The Walnut Catenpillar and its Control," prepared by Mr. C. B. Hutchings, Assistant Entomologist, This circular discusses briefly the life-history and habits of this insect enemy of wallnuts and hickories, and recommends certain control methods. Farmers, nut growers and others who may interested may obtain a copy of this leaflet by writing direct to the Publications Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa. This insect has been specially destructive in western Ontario during recent years.


