But Lord Rosebery is not the L beral party; and after Ireland has received all that Mr. Balfour is disposed to give for the present, and has used the new for the present, and has used the new machinery to help along the march towards Irish legislative power in a parliament sitting in Dublin, the Liberal party, if true to their policy, will still be the Home Rule English party.
