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THE HOLY YEAR.

The Apostolic Delegation has received the Papal decree regarding the opening of the Holy Year, which begins Jan. 1, 1900.

Unprecedented privileges are accorded to the clergy, such as absolving sins during the last night of the departing year 1899, and also permission to communicate thenceforth.

This Papal decree will doubtless be forwarded at once to the bishops of the country, who will in turn communicate the same to their diocesan priests in charge of souls. The text of the universal decree is as follows:

It is most becoming that we who are about to celebrate the commencement of the Holy Year, happily, especially in the month of December, should be in the death of night, etc. to greet the Author of time, and prostrate before His altars, to offer the most acceptable Victim, who is the immaculate Lamb, awaiting at the sacrifice...

Therefore, in order that the approaching year, 1900, may begin happily, and with the participation of the assistance of the Holy Spirit, we have decreed that the Holy Year should be inaugurated on the 24th day of December, at midnight of the coming year, the present century will come to an end, and a new one begin. It is our desire that this happy event be inaugurated by the faithful, who are to God by some pious and solemn ceremony for the benefits received during the course of the present century, and owing to the urgent necessities of the times, that greater devotion be shown in order to begin auspiciously the new era.

Therefore, in order that the approaching year, 1900, may begin happily, and with the participation of the assistance of the Holy Spirit, we have decreed that the Holy Year should be inaugurated on the 24th day of December, at midnight of the coming year, the present century will come to an end, and a new one begin.
