Minister of Justice, who is ex officio Attorney
General of Canada, are clearly set out in the
Department of Justice Act. In essence the
crown, and in that capacity his primary function is to advise the executive. Traditionally
the Minister of Justice and Attorney General
of Canada does not give advice to parliament
or its committees. At his discretion he may
give advice, but in no circumstances would he
express an opinion in a hypothetical case or

Proceedings on Adjournment Motion on matters that are or might come before the courts.

The Minister of Justice, in his capacity as Attorney General of Canada, is expected to advise the heads of the various departments of government upon all matters of law connected with the work of those departments. Opinions given by the law officers of the Crown are privileged and the production or disclosure thereof cannot be compelled.

Motion agreed to and the house adjourned at 10.15 p.m.
