Petitions

to the House of Commons opposing the government's mandatory imposition of the metric system of measurement here in Canada and calling instead for voluntary conversion. The petitioners' view is echoed by widespread and determined opposition in the constituency of Oxford to the government's strong-arm tactics in pushing for compulsory metric. The petitioners hope that the government will come to its senses and be sensitive to the needs, desires and concerns of the Canadian people, allowing them a say in metric conversion.

Mr. Gordon Taylor (Bow River): Madam Speaker, it is my honour today to present a petition on behalf of thousands of my constituents in the Bow River riding in Alberta. My constituents oppose having metric shoved down their throats. They oppose compulsion by a totalitarian government in imposing metric on them. They oppose the spending of millions of their dollars to let the people know what is good for them.

Madam Speaker: Order. I am sure that is not in the title of the petition.

Mr. Taylor: It is.

Madam Speaker: The hon, member must not argue about the petition.

Mr. Taylor: Okay, I won't argue. I simply ask on behalf of my constituents that the government which passed the order in council and made metric compulsory now make it voluntary by order in council.

Mr. Jim Hawkes (Calgary West): Madam Speaker, it is my duty on behalf of thousands of constituents of Calgary West to present this petition to the House. The constituents in my riding are also concerned about the enforced aspect of metric and about the fact that democracy was not well served. The constituents in my riding would like to remind the members of this House and the government that when democratic ways are not attended to the faith which the people have in democracy today is inevitably eroded.
