reached thel great Carrying Place, which divides it

from the Ouisconsin.

The Fox River, from the Green Bay to the carrying place, is about one hundred and eighty miles. From the Winnebago Lake to the Carrying Place, the current is gentle, and the depth confiderable; notwithstanding which, it is in some places with difficulty that canoes can pals through the obstructions they meet with from the rice stalks, which are very large and thick, and grow here in great abundance. The country around it is very fertile, and proper in the highest degree for cultivation, excepting in some places near the river, where it is rather too low. It is in no part very woody, and yet can supply sufficient to answer the demands of any number of inhabitants. This river is the greatest resort for wild fowl of every kind, that I met with in the whole course of my travels; frequently the fun would be obscured by them for some minutes together.

About forty miles up this river, from the great town of the Winnebagoes, stands a smaller town be-

longing to that nation.

Deer and Bears are very numerous in these parts, and a great many beavers and other surs are taken on the streams that empty themselves into this river.

The river I am treating of, is remarkable for having been, about eighty years ago, the residence of the united bands of the Ottigaumies and the Saukies, whom the French had nicknamed, according to their wonted custom, Des Sacks and Des Reynards, the Sacks and the Foxes, of whom the following anecdote

was related to me by an Indian.

About fixty years ago, the French Missionaries and traders having received many insults from this people, a party of the French and Indians, under the command of Capt Morand marched to revenge their wrongs. The Captain set out from the Green Bay in the winter, when they were unsuspicious of a visit of this kind, and pursuing his route over the snow to their villages, which lay about fifty miles up the Fox River, came upon them by surprise, Uuprepared as they
