Toronto Electric Light Co. Willing That Corporation Counsel Should Peruse Its Agreement With Electrical Devel

After Corporation Counsel Drayton as visited the offices of the Toronto Electric Light Company this morning, the city will be in a position for the first time to figure out clearly and intelligently on what basis an offer for the purchase of the company's plant can properly be made. The reason is that Mr. Drayton is to have a private view of that awe-inspiring document whose inmost secrets the hydro-electric commission has sought in vain to probe—the Electric Light Company's contract with the Electrical Development Company, for a supply of power from the latter.

Mr. Drayton yesterday afternoon received a letter from Manager Macrae of the Electric Light Company in which Mr. Macrae expressed himself as willing to let him see the justly celebrated agreement which was the only obstacle in the way of the city's expropriating the company's plant two years ago. The manager suggested that the city counsel make the appointment at the earliest moment he cared to do so, and Mr. Drayton named 10 a.m. to-day.
