HAZELTON CASE REOPENED

OTFAWA. June 2.—(Special.)—At a meeting of the railway committee to be held on Tuesday the Hazelton townsite case, which was referred back to the board by the governor-general-incouncil, will be reheard. This is the case arising out of the application of Robert Kelly and associate of Vancouver for an order approving of the location of a station on lot 882, Cassiar district, and restraining the G. T.P. from locating it on lot 851.

The late Judge Mabee gave a judgment in favor of Kelly, and the government decided to have the case reopened on the grounds that the evidence of several material witnesses had not been heard by the board.
