Can Only Move Grain Crop By Pouring It Over Border

Organ of Western Growers Says Movement Will Be From 10 Days to Two Weeks Later Than Last Year—Thru Railway Rates to U.S. the Remedy.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 23.—(Can. Press.)—Under the caption "A Grain Block Unavoidable," The Grain Growers' Guide will say tomorrow:

"All signs point to a congestion in the movement of grain this fall far worse than that of last fall and winter—and as it was. The exceptional rain-cutting as well as threshing. The weather last fall was unfavorable and the crop movement was greatly delayed. But the grain at this time last year was moving in triple the volume it is at the present time, and this season's crop is considerably in excess of the 1911 crop.

During the two weeks ended September 21 there were only 1288 cars of grain shipped from the western provinces, against 482 for the same period last year. The continued rain of late September, which visited all three provinces, has delayed threshing still more, and the crop movement will probably be from ten days to two weeks later than last year.

"With these facts in hand it is imperative that every effort be put forth to meet these most exceptional conditions. The railways will not be able to handle the grain that is offered them. There is not enough elevator capacity to accommodate the immense quantities of grain that cannot reach the lake front before the close of navigation.

"Cut Rates to United States. "Since the doors to the southern market are closed and locked the best remedy in sight is to have thru railway rates to the south. These thru rates to the south were in force for a time last winter and afforded a great deal of relief. But they were not put into effect this year.

GUATEMALA CITY, Sept. 23.—(Can. Press.)—The Guatemalan Government has rejected the proposal of a syndicate headed by Dr. F. S. Pearson, president of the Mexican and Northwestern Railway Co., to irrigate the extensive plains of the Zacapa district in Guatemala. This project contemplated the water rights and the ownership of a large tract of land.

The newspapers applaud the action of the government, considering that the national interests were not neglected and suggest that the state undertake this work.

Dr. Pearson has been intimately associated with Sir Wm. Mackenzie in the number of Mexican and South American enterprises, and was one of the promoters of the merger of the Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo companies. He has a large following of Canadian investors.

The Canadian Northern Railway are to make further extensions for their Montreal connections. The C. N. R. are now expropriating for a seven-mile line to connect their Moreau street station with the northern portal of the terminal. This line will carry a distance of 1.5 miles to the Lachine-Cartierville-Matongue line of the Grand Trunk Railway, which is to connect the far ends of the city.

IMMIGRATION IS BREAKING ALL RECORDS

More Than 700 Arrived in Toronto in Two Days, Making 3550 So Far This Month, and New Arrivals Are Pouring in Faster Than Ever Before.

More than seven hundred immigrants for Ontario have arrived in Toronto so far this week, and a total of 3550 immigrants have been distributed throughout Ontario this month, as compared with 3800 for the whole month of August.

"September will break the August record," said Robert Birmingham, Dominion Immigration Officer at the Ontario Immigration Office, Union Station, to The World yesterday afternoon. "By September last year the tide of immigration was practically over, but they are now pouring in as fast as at any time in the history of the office was established, and October, in all probability, also will be a record month."

Large families are now coming in from the old country. George Blake and his wife, who arrived yesterday, brought a family of eight children. This family are located in Toronto. Quite a number of wives and children, who are coming to join the husband and father who came ahead and has prospered, are among the immigrants. Mrs. Arthur Hope, who joins her husband in Sarnia, is one of these. She arrived here yesterday with seven children.

Toronto's foreign population is also being swelled by the extended stream of immigration now pouring into Ontario. The foreign section of the city welcomed forty Russians and about as many Syrians yesterday, and more are coming in daily.

TUNNEL OPEN BY AUGUST, 1913

C.N.R. Project in Montreal Will Be Open From End to End in Less Than a Year.

It is now announced that the Canadian Northern Railway tunnel connecting the City of Montreal with the C. N. R. model city Mount Royal, will be open from end to end by August next year. This will make the phenomenal record of the completion of a three and a half miles of tunnel within a year after the work was commenced.

The rate of work has been increased until the length of tunnel is growing at the rate of 80 feet per day. As soon as the hard rock is found on the city side of the mountain, the rate on that side will be increased twenty feet a day as well.
