HAMILTON HAPPENINGS RATEPAYERS WILL BE ASKED TO APPROVE \$30,000 BY-LAW

For Home for Incurables—October 19 to Be a School Holiday.

Hamilton, Oct. 4.—(Special.)—The finance committee this evening decided to submit a by-law next January, asking for \$30,000 for a home for incurables. The aldermen declined to be mixed up with the plans of the Working Girls' Club of the Y.W.C.A., which has undertaken to operate a street car route to raise money for the home.

The international management of the board of education will recommend to the board that the teaching of domestic science be continued in the public schools, but Inspector J. H. Leake will be asked to give pointers on how the teaching may be done systematically.

The committee agreed to make the Friday following Thanksgiving Day a holiday in the schools. The trustees will adopt the use of the Hunter-Rose copybooks, with the medical science being continued in the city and the rest of the county.

H. Macquoen of the Commercial Hotel was fined \$40 for keeping his bar open after hours. He appeared before this afternoon Judge Monk quashed the magistrate's ruling.

"Col. Mary has begun a suit against Eirwan and Darcy Martin for an accounting of the moneys he alleged were collected by the late Edward Martin, C. C.

This evening the following provisional directors were appointed for the Y. W. C. A. in the west end: David E. Henderson, W. Brown, W. J. Orr, R. Kerr, J. P. Fenton, C. H. McGregor, Geo. Crook, F. L. McLean, J. E. Henstridge, E. S. Vanstickle, H. Drestback and John Hopkins. They will report on a site and the probable cost of a building. The association now has a membership of forty.

To Protect Life. Coroner Baugh finished the enquiry into the death of Charles Hurd, fatally injured by falling from a scaffold, on the 2nd inst. in a verdict recommending that more care and better material and better workmen should be employed in the erection of scaffolds.

The Street Railway Company denies the report that it is unwilling to refer a matter to arbitration. The company says that they are willing to pay half the cost of even Mr. Gardiner's bill, if it means doing so to do so, and the only reason that it has not done so is that it did not want to allow the union for the amount of \$25,000.

The public library board is discussing the advisability of issuing two cards to each patron of the library, one for fiction and the other for books of a more substantial character.

Hon. A. B. Morine, ex-leader of the opposition in Newfoundland, addressed the Twentieth Century Club this evening, and thought the Conservative party ought to make consideration a plank in its platform.

Hears on to Award. The street railway arbitration award is still in the hands of the third arbitrator, Joseph Jardine, who refuses to give it up until his bill for \$406 is paid. The \$46 in incidentals and expenses, and he figures the rest of the bill at \$35 a day for sixteen days. The company and the men will allow him the incidentals and pay at the rate of \$25 for eight days. It is said that the company is not at all anxious to release the award.

Rev. C. E. Whitcombe has sent in his resignation as rector of St. Matthew's Church and has left the ability to spend two years in the old world. Some of his parishioners feel hurt because he did not bid them good-bye. He is the man who will be in charge of the church.

Donald Sutherland, who attempted to end his life yesterday, has been placed in the asylum.

Bernard Gibney, Toronto, was this morning fined \$10 for ill-treating a horse. He is the man who, two months ago, wrote a note stating that he had committed suicide, and put the message in a bottle that was picked up at the beach.

Ex-Ald. Robert C. Rutledge is an applicant for the post of assessor, made vacant by the death of F. R. Hutton.

In the Police Court. The Mercer Reformatory for 15 months was the punishment meted out by Magistrate Denison to Louis Klackey, a domestic, who stole about \$200 worth of articles from his mistress, Mrs. Meek.

John Smith, on a charge of assaulting and robbing David Robins of \$15 in the Queen-street subway, was found guilty and sent to jail for sixty days with hard labor.

James Currie, a teamster, was up on a charge of assaulting and robbing George W. Prior of \$175. James Crane, who is said to have been implicated in the robbery, was in the dock. The prisoners were remanded until Monday.

Matthew J. Lelliss appeared on a charge of carrying concealed weapons, pleaded guilty and was fined \$25 and costs or thirty days in jail. The revolver was confiscated.
