WHIPPING POST, NOT JAIL AS CURE FOR THIRTEEN

How Rev. A. B. Winchester Would Deal With the Pauper Question.

The General Ministerial Association yesterday heard an address from Rev. Dr. Winchester on "The Church's Duty to the Foreign Population," in which he pointed out the danger of the church pauperizing the people by a multiplicity of charities and missions overlapping each other. He maintained the work could not be done effectively as it was being done by city churches, and he suggested that the church should help to organize and coordinate the work. He outlined a plan of dividing the city into large districts. The central organization should be interdenominational in character, and there should be co-operation of all the churches. Each district should be under a superintendent, and there should be a general superintendent at the head of the united organization. Each district should have a well-equipped building with every amenity that tends to develop the body as well as the mind.

This problem had confronted the people of Toronto, he said; and defined the pauper as not necessarily poor, but pauperized by the church. He suggested that the church should help to organize and coordinate the work. He outlined a plan of dividing the city into large districts. The central organization should be interdenominational in character, and there should be co-operation of all the churches. Each district should be under a superintendent, and there should be a general superintendent at the head of the united organization. Each district should have a well-equipped building with every amenity that tends to develop the body as well as the mind.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

MASS MEETING TO-NIGHT TO DISCUSS CHEAP POWER

Hydro-Power Commissioners and Engineers Will Speak—Live Stock Arena.

Hamilton, Dec. 10.—(Special.)—Great preparations are being made for the mass meeting in the city council chamber Tuesday evening in connection with the government's cheap power scheme. The members of the hydro-electric power commission and their engineer and several of the members of the Western Municipalities' Union will be present. A general invitation has been extended to all those who are interested in the subject, and they will be given an opportunity to ask as many questions as they desire.

Flamboyant House Burglarized.

The ex-detective denies the allegation, and the matter will be further enquired into by a grand jury on Jan. 7.

A boy and matches set fire to a bedroom in B. Snyder's house, 237 East Hunter-street, this afternoon. The loss was about \$200. Mrs. M. A. Adams was carried out unconscious. It is understood that a \$250,000 amusement company has been organized to establish various attractions at Dunes Park, on the beach, to be operated next summer.

Live Stock Arena.
The suggestion of The Captious One (The Sunday World), that a live stock arena should be established in Hamilton, has been taken up already. W. D. Platt, the well-known importer of thoroughbred cattle, says that there is no doubt that such a show would be a splendid success. Mr. Platt figures that the expense would not be more than \$200,000, and he thinks that the sum could be easily raised, and that it would prove a paying investment. His idea is that the fair should be held in the winter of 1907, and that it should be a speciality of horses. "Hamilton," he continued, "is away behind in the matter of fairs for the last twenty years. There is no reason why, if the necessary initial impetus is given by the government, a winter fair should not become an attraction to Western Ontario in the same way that Toronto Fair is to the contiguous parts of the province in the summer."

GILLETTE SENTENCED TO DIE
During Week of Jan. 28—Protests His Innocence.

Herkimer, N.Y., Dec. 10.—Chester E. Gillette this afternoon was sentenced to die in the electric chair at Auburn Prison during the week beginning Jan. 28. He will be taken to Auburn to-morrow.

The youth, who was convicted of the murder, on July 11 last at Big Moose Lake, of his sweetheart, "Billy" Brown, gave no sign of emotion when Justice Devendorf pronounced sentence. His face was pale, but his step was steady and his voice was not shaken.

"I am innocent of the crime charged in the indictment and therefore it should not be passed," he said firmly when asked the formal questions as to whether he had anything to say before sentence was pronounced. "Anything more?" enquired Justice Devendorf.

"No, I think not," he answered. Gillette is 23 years old. Gillette's counsel moved that the verdict be set aside, and a new trial granted, but the motion was denied, as was another motion that judgment be arrested and all proceedings set aside.

Mrs. Louise Gillette, mother of Chester Gillette, arrived in this city to-day. To a representative of the press Mrs. Gillette expressed a wish to hear from her own son the story of his guilt or innocence.

"I do not know whether my boy has made a confession or not," she sobbed, "but if he tells me he killed the girl, then he must be punished. My son should not escape the penalty of his crime if he is guilty any more than the son of any other woman should. I love him with all the affection a mother is capable of. There is no sacrifice I would not make for him, but if guilty he should go to the electric chair. If he tells me he is guilty I want him to take his punishment, and take it like a man."

It was evident that Mrs. Gillette believed all she said. Her confidence in her son has not been shaken by his conviction, and it will take his own word that he is guilty to cause her to cease her fight to save his life.

Hamilton, Dec. 10.—(Special.)—To-night a young man walked into James

seller's grocery store at 136 South Ferguson-avenue, and demanded Mr. Seller's money. Mr. Seller refused to comply with the demand, and the intruder drew a revolver. The grocer's wife, who was standing by, saw the hold-up man drawing his revolver, and she rushed at him with a broom. Her pluck probably saved her husband's life, for the man fired point blank at him. The bullet grazed the grocer's head and crushed thru a show case. The man with the revolver turned and beat a hasty retreat before Mrs. Seller's onslaught with the broom. Detective Campbell and a half dozen policemen were soon on the scene, but could find no trace of the would-be burglar.

Want to Buy Railway.

This evening the city council appointed a committee to ascertain how much the Cataract Power Co. would take for its street railway, the committee to report to the next meeting of the council. The firmers were recommended for an increase from \$2.50 to \$3 a day. H. L. Barr's application for promotion was not granted. The council adjourned until Dec. 27.

Stewart for Mayor.

This evening Ald. T. J. Stewart, chairman of the board of works for the past four years, was again elected mayor. He was given an enthusiastic reception. He has a pronounced opinion in the fight against the aggressive Cataract Power Co. and in the council this evening moved the resolution asking for a vote of confidence in the mayor. The motion was carried by a large majority.

Victim of Riot.

Crown Attorney Washington is enquiring into the circumstances connected with the death of Chas. Franks, who died Saturday night. Mr. Franks was a consumptive, and on the night of the riot was clubbed by a policeman. It is charged that he was struck twice, once on the neck and again on his spine. Dr. Dillabough, who has been attending to the case, has not yet been able to find out how much the company would take for its street railway.

Vancouver, Geneva and Berlin are all

in open rebellion against the Voliva

regime.

The announced purpose of the seces-

sionists is to drive Voliva out of Zion.

solve the problem, have not fallen thru.

Members of the Lincoln County Council

will change hands before long. If pur-

chased by the N. St. C. & T. R. it

would be improved the same as Pres-

ident Frederic Nicholls has improved the

St. Catharines Niagara Falls line, and

would at once be extended from Beam-

sville to St. Catharines.
