That market takes the most of its supplies from Russia, and this appreciation in values is taken as confirmation of the previous reports of crop failures in several districts of the Czar's European empire. These developments and the unusual demand for rye from Germany. are construed as encuraging by the advocates of higher prices. On the other hand, the beats are relying upon the extraordinary crops in nearly all countries that have garnered their grain during the past few months. Reliable authorities figure that the European and American harvests will more than suffice for all requirements after represishing the world's depleted reserves—and this without calling upon Argentina, Australia and other countries whose crops come in during the winer. On the whole the majority of authorities claim that the bears have the best of the outlook. Meantime the public is out of the Chicago market.

Bradstreet's statement of the world's wheat stocks on Oct. 1 shows an increase for September in Canada and the United States of 10,225,000 bushels, and an increase abroad of 5,400,000 bushels—or an increase in Europe and America of only 15,500,000 bushels for September, against an increase of 27,000,000 bushels in September, 1897. The Canadian, United States and European stocks are 84,928,000 bushels. The United States and Canadian stocks are the smallest since 1882.

Canadian Flour Trade.

The Montreal Trade Bulletin says: The receipts of flour were heavy during the past week, and quite a lot was shipped to Newfoundland and British ports, but the greater portion consisted of American brands. We learn that freight has been engaged for about 100,000 barrels of American flour from this port for this month's shipment, besides what has been taken for November. A lot of flour was shipped from here to Newfoundland this week which was said formed part of a large contract of 25,000 barrels, but the sale was made some time ago by a Western mill, and was therefore not new business. Our advices from Liverpool by last mail report large receipts of American flour and some Canadian. The sale was reported of a round lot of Canadian winter patents at 26s 3d, but since then sales have been reported by cable at 25s 9d to 26s per sack of 280 lbs. for the same brand of flour belonging to a Western mill. Canadian spring patents have sold in Liverpool at 29s, but this week cables were received reporting sales at 28s 6d. It would, therefore, seem that the Americans have not got all the market to themselves on the other side, and, as farmers are beginning to offer their wheat taore freely in the West, a good trade may yet be done in Ontario flour for export Canadian Flour Trade. Public is Out of the Wall Street

The Electoral Campaign Now in Progress Has Created a Sentiment of Timidity on the New York Board and Stocks Have Been Irregular All Week-Berlin a Factor in C. P. R.'s Weakness Saturday Evening, Oct. 8.

Wall-street has seen another irregular week. The feeling of hesitation on the part of the average speculator noticed for some time past has since Saturday last been more apparent than ever, and the market has been aimost wholly in the hands of the professionals and big operators. The continued depression in Sugar and Tobacco, due to trade competition in the one case and to bad faith among the bulls in the other, has had its effect in giving prices a serious set back, and in scaring the public out of the arena. Another and deeper source of the timidity at present displayed by all classes of traders is no doubt to be found in the electoral campaign now well under way. The outcome of the coniest is of consequence to Wall-street, There is, it may be said, very little fear that the permanence of the present gold standard world be at all impaired, even in case the Democrats should secure a majority in the National Legislature. Henry Clews thus sums up the pros and cons of the security situation—on Wallstreet:
