### THE WORLD'S SPECIAL FEATURES

The World has never before furnished its large and growing constituency with so many good reasons for supporting it as it does today. We are trying to be a newspaper in the best sense of that term. But we give the first prominence to Canadian news, to the development of Canada's resources, and to the vital interests of the Canadian people. Any energy we have we prefer to devote to Canadian features rather than going outside of our own country. Nor are we publishing a story paper or pages devoted to literary mediocrity.

But, besides being a Canadian newspaper, The World claims the support of the entire Canadian public on account of its attitude on the great questions which are of supreme interest to every man, woman and child at stake in this country. The World is fighting the battles of the people as against the monopolists, as against the railroads, who wish to control everything and to make their own rules, as against the trolley line people, the electric companies, the telephone monopolists, and all others of a similar character. This is the kind of a fight that takes money, that takes nerve, and takes courage. The World is fighting for the people, and the newspaper that has the courage to go into such a fight is the one that is entitled to, and we are glad to say, is getting, the support of the people of this country.

Let us send a correspondent to Africa or a lady specialist to the Stikine, but it takes newspaper nerve and resource to tackle the trolley bandit, for instance, or a Minister of the Crown who occupies the position of Attorney-General of Ontario and the head of an electric combine. It takes some nerve and enterprise to tell Mr. Shaughnessy and Mr. Hays that they do not own this country and that they must not over-ride the rights of the people. But it is an easy job to get up a page of goody-goody stories, to pass compliments on everybody, and to laudate ad nauseam all the newspapers in the Dominion.

On account of the stand it has taken, The World has the support of men of all shades in politics. While it sympathizes with the Conservative party, it is not a party paper. It is because it thinks it is best suited to the interests of the people; nevertheless The World is at a fight to expect, and we are glad to know its attitude. The support of the people is all over Ontario and the Dominion at large, who are dissatisfied with the conduct of a newspaper that once professed to speak for the people and now only speaks for the Government. Reformers must admit that the World is speaking their views on all the fighting questions of the day and that no other paper is doing it so well. The World is not for the corporations or capitalists, but for the people. One would think from the editorials of professed Liberal papers that they were actually the servants of the Government. The World, therefore, appeals to the people, Conservative and Reformers, to try and spread its influence and circulation and to show by their recognition that they appreciate what it is doing. In this country where we have hushed or go quiet, or neglect to take a decided stand when great questions are involved, and great questions are involved, we are doing in the way of sending out correspondents to the uttermost ends of the earth. The World is living at home, devoting its energies to home interests, and to the people of this country, and claims that such a work is the one most worthy of encouragement.

### GREASY PAVEMENTS AND BICYCLES.

The World again directs the attention of the City Engineer to the fact that bicycles now constitute a great majority of vehicles running over the streets, and that the time has arrived when more consideration ought to be paid them. More than 20,000 bicycles are owned in the City of Toronto. Yesterday the asphalt pavements were what might be called greasy, and it was worth while to ride on, and consequently, many a man's life was in jeopardy when an asphalt street made a junction with the street railway. Our contention is that this is not the first time we have stated it, and that the City Engineer, and the Street Commissioner for running a sweeper along asphalt streets on days such as yesterday, and make a path on either side of the roadway, and at every crossing where a junction is made with the street railway tracks, every foot of it should be thoroughly swept two or three times a day. The sweeper is too expensive to be a man with a rubber scraper 16 inches wide to make a bicycle path on each side of every asphalted roadway in the city. One man with such a rubber scraper could sweep three miles in an hour, as he would simply have to push it ahead of him. Wherever this scraper passed over would be dry within an hour.

One would think, as The World has often suspected, that the City Engineer responsible for the roadway were standing in with the Street Railway Company in order to close bicycle traffic on every possible occasion.

sion, and to force it into the street cars.

As a matter of fact, the street cars are now overcrowded, especially when the weather is bad, and those are the days when a little forethought exercised by the city officials would enable the bicycles to run.

We believe that there are not 20 days in the year in Toronto when bicycles could not run.

The greatest freedom was a little care exercised by the city in keeping the bicycle tracks dry, or at least dry enough to run over.

Every day that the bicycles are prevented running it means that the citizens must pay from \$500 to \$1000 into the coffers of the Street Railway Company, and in that way the cars are overcrowded, those who own bicycles are prevented from using them, and travel is hampered.

The city officials must get it into their heads that the bicycle must be considered as well as the other kinds of wheeled traffic. In fact, the coming vehicular traffic is to be on rubber wheels (and, we trust, without horses), and the sooner engineers and officials who have charge of streets recognize this fact, the better will it be for us all.

SERVING TWO MASTERS.

A few weeks ago Mr. John Moodie, of Hamilton, a shareholder in the Catear Power Company, entered an action against the company in connection with some stock.

This action was not of general importance in itself, but it was the means of making known certain facts, which The World claims are of great public interest.

These facts refer to Mr. Moodie's connection with the company.

Mr. Moodie is the president of the Catear Power Company, and the Catear Power Company is a company which has been organized for the purpose of generating power for the city of Hamilton.

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
