TWENTY-SECOND YEAR

WOMAN GAVE HER HUSBAND A CHARGE WITH THE GODMOTHER

Mrs. White of Brantford Lodged in Jail, Suspected of Administering Strychnine With Fatal Results—To Get Insurance on His Life is Said to Have Been the Motive—Damaging Evidence Given.

Brantford, April 30.—At the hearing of the case of the death of Mrs. Josephine White, which was held at the court house here this morning, the jury was told that the accused, Mrs. White, was charged with the murder of her husband, who died of strychnine poisoning, which was suspected to have been administered by her.

The evidence of a son, Frank White, who is in receipt of a pension from the government, was given. He testified that he saw his mother administer a substance to his father, which he believed to be strychnine. He also testified that he saw his mother hide a box of strychnine in the kitchen.

The jury returned a verdict of guilty, and Mrs. White was sentenced to a term of imprisonment in the Brantford Jail. Her husband's death occurred on the night of the 15th of this month. She was charged with administering a fatal dose of strychnine to her husband, who died of the poison.

The case is expected to be continued in court next week. The jury's verdict was based on the evidence given by the son and other witnesses.

INSINUATIONS OF CORRUPTION IN BRITISH HOUSE OF COMMONS

Socialists John Burns and Keir Hardie Made Suggestive Remarks Which Caused Some Acrimony—The House Regarded as an Annex to the Stock Exchange.

London, April 30.—The discussion in the House of Commons today of a private bill, conferring additional powers on the London & North-Western Railway, led to a great deal of acrimonious recrimination. Mr. John Burns (Socialist), who was the Opposition in general, opposed the measure, was called to order by the Speaker for insinuating some of the railway directors in the House as "immoral guinea pigs."

Mr. Burns' special reference was to Mr. MacCarty, who was elected a director of the London & North-Western Railway after having been appointed financial secretary to the Admiralty. The bill was finally rejected by a vote of 210 to 292, amid prolonged cheers.

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COAL TAX SHOVED ASIDE

Irish Members Had an Inting and Claimed for State Ownership of Railway.

London, April 30.—In the House of Commons the discussion of the coal tax was crowded out tonight by a long debate upon the Irish railways. Mr. John P. Hayden (Nationalist), member for South Roscommon, moved a resolution demanding that the existing railway rates in Ireland be reduced to the level of the rates in Great Britain, and that the railways be transferred to the state.

Mr. Hayden's motion was supported by several other members, including Mr. T. W. Russell (Liberal), who spoke in favor of the resolution. The motion was, however, rejected.
