CANADA WILL HAVE HER OWN MINT.

Continued from Page 1. somewhat ornamental on top of that. This would cost \$14,400 more, and extra work would cost \$40,000, so that the total cost of building, vaults and equipment would be \$200,000.

As to this incidental profit, Canada had made an average profit of 10 per cent during the past 10 years of over \$9,000,000. So that our mint would be self-sustaining. Of course, we could save money by having a mint of our own at all, just as we could save money by having a mint in England instead of in Ottawa, but that could not properly be called a national spirit. Allowing for the annual cost of the mint we should, however, have an average annual profit of \$2,000,000 to the government.

Mr. Fielding went on to say that it would be carried out fully by the Government there would also be a purchasing agency office somewhere in the west; it was not necessary to establish it at the moment. Some advised that it should be in Dawson, others argued with force that it should be established in British Columbia. However, as it would not be done in Canada, it will be decided during the summer and the visit to the West of Mr. Sifton, and he hoped the Premier would help in the matter. He asked why the Minister should be asked to estimate the amount of gold from year to year by estimate instead of by statute.

Mr. Fielding replied the reason was that the British Government desired a fixed arrangement. Mr. W. F. Maclean said the proof of the ability of Canada to absorb more silver than the present quantity of circulation of millions of American silver, which the Government should take means to keep out. Our present subsidiary coinage was copper, but he hoped to see nickel, which would be in abundance, used for our subsidiary coinage. It was the Minister's remarks, he added, that had just put him into the opposite position which had prevented the coinage of silver in Canada, namely, the Canadian banks.
