Fully 1500 representative farmers were present, and prices obtained must have been most gratifying to Mr. Baxter. One span of draught horses, rising 2 and 4-year-old, brought \$384, and altogether \$1400 was realized from the sale of horses. Cattle ranged in value from \$70 to \$40, and more than \$1200 was secured from this source alone. The total receipts of the sale amounted to \$4025, testifying alike to the general excellence of Mr. Baxter's stock and the ability of Mr. Beldam.

SOME ODDS AND ENDS.  
Hon. G. E. Foster Addresses Young Men of St. Paul's Church.

Hon. George E. Foster gave an address before the Young Men's Association of St. Paul's Church last night. Fred C. Jarvis, president of the association, was in the chair. Mr. Foster, at the outset, observed that in this rushing age people did not take sufficient time to think. He pleaded for more time to think, and suggested some things which were worth pausing to think about. In referring to Earl Grey's public house trust, he said any movement in favor of temperance ought to be encouraged. The prevalent iniquity of ballot-box stuffing was striking a blow at democratic institutions, and from this text Mr. Foster proceeded to notice the recent convention of the student volunteer movement, which is a remarkable movement, free from sensationalism, and it was gratifying to see a religious movement connected with the institutions of higher learning.

He asked, have the people grown with the remarkable development of the country? We must, he said, be able to hold our own in the world competition. Technical education should be encouraged, and it should be placed in the bottom of the barrel. Canadians, Mr. Foster said, had gained an intelligent sense of adaptation from the South African war, and he commented on the remarkable growth of the Pacific Ocean as a theatre of commerce. The foresight shown in building the Canadian Pacific Railway and keeping British Columbia in Confederation, was commendable. Some of the results of the war were the development of the national fibre and self-reliance, and above all, the giving of the answer that Canada and
