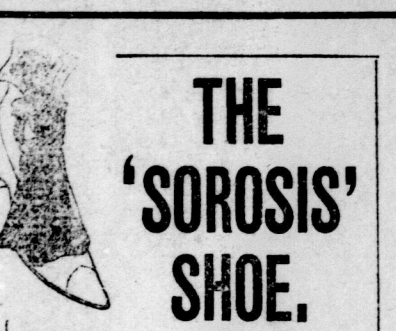

Nearly Three to One

Late Returns of Irish County Elections.

Complete Victory of Nationalists Over the Conservative Party.

The Anglo-Canadian Trade Assumes Large Proportions.

Unrest in Macedonia-Loss of British Steamer Cato-Seven Persons Accidentally Shot at an Entertainment.

London, April 9. - The results of the first Irish county council elections, under the new local government act, are arriving slowly. It is known that 300 Nationalists and 83 Unionists have been elected. The results in Dublin county were 13 Nationalists and 7 Unionists; Kilkenney, 20 to 1; King's county, 20 to 1; Mayo, 9 to 0; Westmeath, 21 to 2; Derry, Carlow, 20 to 0. Miss Charlotte Barrington, the only woman candidate, was elected in Limerick. Lord Mayo received only 19 votes in Wicklow, and Lord Castle-town only 17 votes in Cork. Labor candidates won 11 out of the 16 seats in the Limerick district.
The Earl of Dunraven and Mount- Earl, Baron Monagle of Brandon, and Baron Emly, Unionists, were elected in the Limerick districts.
KILLED WHILE PLAYING "WAR." During an entertainment representing a battle between the British and Chinese at Oadby, near Leicester, Saturday evening, seven persons were shot and wounded, which it was not known were loaded.

STEAMER LOST.

The British steamer Cato foundered 16 miles north of Longship's lighthouse, on the coast of Cornwall. The captain, his wife, and six others of the ship's company have been landed at Milford Haven by a steam trawler.

The trawler Vivid reports that when 15 miles off Lundy Island she saw the masts of a large vessel suddenly disappear, and soon afterward saw three men in a dingy, praying and shrieking for help. The Vivid endeavored to reach the men, but the boat sank, and its occupants did not reappear.

TEMPERANCE CONGRESS.

The International Temperance Congress, now being held in Paris, is attracting considerable attention. The discussions of the congress have given prominence to the radical and despotic measure of the St. Petersburg municipal council to suppress or check drunkenness. The city government has arbitrarily closed 25,000 dram shops, substituting 5,000 under state control, wherein a variety of liquors and the amount sold is to be strictly limited.

ANGLO-CANADIAN TRADE.

The imports during the month of March from Canada to the United Kingdom were: 2,202 cattle, valued at \$35,365; 97,700 cwt. of wheat, valued at \$23,850; 61,800 cwt. of wheat, meal and flour, valued at \$32,021; 33,600 cwt. of peas, valued at \$9,794; 647 cwt. of bacon, valued at \$23,054; 8,521 cwt. of hams, valued at \$15,003; 1,864 cwt. of butter, valued at \$3,221; 12,067 cwt. of cheese, valued at \$27,898; 1,294 loads of wood and wood timber, valued at \$2,808; 17,912 loads dressed lumber, valued at \$42,872; 52 horses valued at \$100; 4,160 tons of wood pulp, valued at \$15,221. The total value of the imports was \$453,789, while the exports were valued at \$347,567. Several articles were omitted from both imports and export returns. At the offices of the high commissioner for Canada a firm has made inquiries for a Canadian manufacturer of cook stoves. A Cardiff firm wants the name of a manufacturer of raspberry pulp, and a Glasgow firm seeks similar information regarding manufacturers of broom handles and exporters of seeds and peas.

SENSATIONAL STORY FROM BERLIN.

London, April 10. - The Berlin correspondent of the Standard says: Emperor William sent instructions to the German ambassador in London and Washington to the general effect that Germany considers the new government of Samoa illegal, and the action of the British and Americans a clear violation of the Samoa act. The report of the behavior of Admiral Kautz toward the German cruiser Falke has given umbrage throughout the empire, and it is considered certain that if the report is confirmed, the United States will readily admit Germany's right to satisfaction, and will repair Admiral Kautz's errors. It is hoped, however, that the accounts are exaggerated.

Wellington, N. Z., April 9. - The imperial government has accepted the offer of the colony to dispatch a boat to Samoa, but the troops offered are not required.

THE TONGAS.

A dispatch to the London Times from Melbourne says private advices have been received from the Tonga Islands that the captain of the British warship Tauranga and the British vice-consul recently concluded an arrangement with the king of the islands, binding him not to part with his sovereign rights or to cede, sell or mortgage any of his territory to any foreign power. Great Britain will guarantee the independence of the kingdom.

TURKISH ATROCITIES.

Aden, April 10. - Advices received from Sana, the capital of Yemen, Arabia, say that fighting between the Turks and the revolting Zaidis continues, and that the former are committing such atrocities that the inhabitants have sworn to fight to the last man.

BRITAIN'S HOLD ON CHINA.

It is announced that Great Britain will formally occupy her new territory of Kow-Loon, adjoining Hong-Kong, on April 17.

British authorities have been pressing Chinese officials in Peking for an

extension of the territory about Hong Kong ceded to Great Britain by the treaties of Canton and Nankin, on the ground that more land is needed for government buildings. Apparently the request has been granted.

THE POPE'S CONDITION.

London, April 10. - The Rome correspondent of the Daily Mail says: While the pope's health has improved, few deny that his life is slowly ebbing away.

THREE CROWNED HEADS TO MEET.

Vienna, April 10. - It is reported that there will be a meeting of the czar, the German emperor and Emperor Francis Joseph at Sciernevice, Russia, upon the occasion of a great hunting party next fall.

"RIDICULOUS."

Paris, April 10. - The Matin this morning publishes reports of interviews with Comte Esterhazy, who, referring to the testimony of Gen Roget, before the court of cassation, in the Dreyfus proceedings, says Roget's accusations are ridiculous. It was not he, he declares, who gave to the London Daily Chronicle the letters sent to President Faure. These letters were dictated to him.

The statement printed in the London Observer yesterday morning that he told the proprietress of that paper that he wrote the Bordereau under orders, and that Dreyfus did not write it, Comte Esterhazy characterizes as a ridiculous invention.

READY TO RULE.

Gotha, April 10. - In the tele today, a declaration from the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, was read in which the former announced that he was prepared, in view of the death recently of Prince Alfred of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, son and heir of the reigning duke, to assume the government of the duchy should a contingency arrive.

CABLE NOTES.

The "People" learns that the treasury has decided that the evidence in the case against Lord Hooley, the bankrupt speculator and company promoter, does not justify his prosecution for fraud.

A Rome dispatch says a drunken man threw a stone yesterday afternoon into the carriage in which Queen Margherita was riding. The missile missed the queen, who displayed no alarm over the affair.

An American Protestant missionary at Han Kow, a Chinese treaty port on the Yang Tse Kiang, makes sensational allegations against the Roman Catholics of burning Protestant chapels and torturing Protestants. He gives the name of a priest concerned, and pictures a reign of terror in certain districts.

The district messenger boy, Elsey, who left London on the afternoon of April 1 for California, in order to rival the recent trip of Jaggers, is on board the steamer Etruria, which sailed from Liverpool for New York on April 1.

An attempt has been made to assassinate the czar's aide-de-camp, Gen. Mauzey. He was cut in the throat by a servant, but not seriously hurt.

The London Daily Telegraph's Vienna correspondent says: "Most unfavorable news has been received in official quarters from Macedonia. The insurrectionary feeling is increasing."

A LONG WAR LOOKED FOR

Though Many 'Pinos Are Returning to Peaceful Pursuits.

Large Reinforcements Needed for the U. S. Forces.

Manila, April 10. - Though hundreds of Filipinos are daily returning to their homes, and are desirous of resuming peaceful pursuits, and though the proclamation issued by the United States Philippine commission has given an impetus to this movement, the war is far from ended. One of the foremost American generals said recently: "We will see a hundred thousand soldiers in the Philippines before the Americans control the islands," and a majority of the army are of his opinion.

It is generally considered that great reinforcements are necessary, there not being a sufficient number of American troops in the archipelago to make conquest of the island of Luzon, and hold the ports occupied, and it is thought that it would be cheaper to keep a large force of troops in the Philippines, and have a better effect upon the natives to establish American supremacy effectually and quickly than to temporize with a score of rebellions.

All the stories told by prisoners and friendly natives agree that a majority of the insurgents

WOULD BE GLAD TO QUIT,

but that there are enough professional revolutionists left to infest the country with bands of hundreds of men, and to demoralize business for years to come. Some high Americans believe that the government would wisely expend money in buying off Aguinaldo and his clique of influential Filipinos.

Foreigners in Manila think the Americans are too optimistic as to the effects of the proclamation. They say that the weakness of the natives lies in the fact that the natives have so long dealt with the Spaniards that they are unable to realize what its words mean and that the purpose of its promises is anything but a snare.

A majority of the United States volunteers are eager to return home, and "WE DID NOT ENLIST TO FIGHT NIGGERS" is a remark that is constantly heard. While braver work than they are doing is impossible to find, there is small glory in guerilla warfare, the dangers and hardships of which cannot be expiated at home. The volunteers construe their enlistment "to the close of the war" to apply to the war with Spain, and wish to be "relieved by regulars."

The Spanish system of defending

Manila by a line of blockhouses may be adopted by the American authorities here during the wet season, as it requires fewer men than the trench defenses, and lessens the chances of sickness.

Lieut. Steunenberg, of the Idaho Regiment, a brother of the governor of Idaho, has been placed on trial by court-martial for calling Major Fig-gins a coward in the presence of his company. It is expected that he will be dismissed from the service.

Manila, April 9. - 3:45 a.m. - At nightfall last night Gen. Lawton and King launched an expedition of three gunboats, with 1,500 picked men in canoes, in tow of the gunboats. The object of the expedition is to cross the lake, capture Santa Cruz and sweep the country to the south.

At the mouth of the Pasig River the men will be transferred from the canoes to the three gunboats Laguna de Bay, Cesto and Napinda. Santa Cruz, the objective point of the expedition, is at the extreme end of the lake.

Gen. Otis reports that everything is quiet in his command, and that many of the Filipinos in the vicinity of Manila are displaying flags in token of submission to United States authority. Aguinaldo has issued a decree directing that Spanish shall be the official language throughout the archipelago, and protesting against the American pretension to force the use of English on the natives who do not know it.

CAPTURED SANTA CRUZ.

Manila, April 10. - 6:50 p.m. - Gen. Lawton has captured Santa Cruz, at the extreme end of the lake. He drove the rebels, who were commanded by a Chinaman named Pao Wah, into the mountains. The Americans had six men wounded. The rebels lost 48 men killed, and had 40 men wounded.

DISPATCHES FROM OTIS.

Washington, April 10. - The following dispatches were received from General Otis today: "Manila, April 9. - Adjutant-General, Washington: Lawton now opposite La Guna de Bay with 1,500 men. Condition of troops excellent. Sickness slight. OTIS."

"Lawton's command captured Santa Cruz, chief city of Laguna de Bay, this morning. Casualties, 6 wounded. Insurgent troops driven, leaving 68 dead on the field, and a large number of wounded; a considerable number captured. Lawton will pursue westward. OTIS."

END IN SIGHT OF DREYFUS CASE

Important Announcement by Premier Dupuy.

Fumishment of the Faults of Individuals Will Have No Effect Upon the Status of the Army-Malta to Speak English.

Paris, April 10. - Speaking today at LePuy, capital of the department of Haute-Loire, Prime Minister Dupuy referred to the Dreyfus case, the end of which, he said, was now in sight. The complications, he added, would be unraveled by the court of cassation, whose judgment everybody would acknowledge. The government considered it important to reassert its determination to suppress all polemics which could lead the army into the question. As soon as the court's decision was given the government would take the necessary measures to determine responsibility, but the punishment of the faults of individuals would not affect the army, which was a vast family, including all the sons of the country. It was said it would remain France's present security and hope of the future, and was the indispensable guardian of the constitution and laws.

MALTA TO SPEAK ENGLISH.

Valet, Malta, April 10. - An order in council has been issued allowing the use of the English language in all oral and written proceedings in all the courts of Malta in all cases where Englishmen are plaintiffs or defendants, or witnesses.

Hitherto Italian only was used, and the grievance under which Englishmen laborers reached a culminating point when Colonel Hewson threatened to three days' imprisonment for refusing to sign his deposition, which was drawn up in Italian.

A proclamation also announces that after fifteen years from this date the English language shall be substituted for the Italian in all the Maltese courts.

THE CZAR'S PEACE CONGRESS.

London, April 10. - With the appointment of delegates the prospects for a peace conference begin to assume definite shape. All countries have paid the czar a compliment by appointing representatives and commending it in this particular respect. It is remarkable here that the czar may regard the kaiser's appointment of Stengel, who regards war as a necessity, and peace as a perilous sentiment, as a rather bad joke. It is now generally accepted that the conference will accomplish nothing in the way of disarmament, or an agreement to refrain from new scientific discoveries. America and Japan will refuse to consider a reduction of armament, and England will refuse to reduce its army, and has already withdrawn the conference, offered to diminish naval shipbuilding if Russia will do the same.

It is possible, however, that the conference may bring arbitration to precede war much nearer, and additions to the Geneva convention and further security for private property at sea in war time are very likely.

HAMILTON INDUSTRIES AMALGAMATE.

Hamilton, Ont., April 10. - Negotiations are in progress for the amalgamation of the Hamilton Blast Furnace Company and the Ontario Rolling Mills Company. If the deal goes through the new company will run the smelting works, rolling mills and forge works on their present sites, and will establish immense storage yards in the smelting works site. The two concerns employ 600 hands, and this number will be greatly augmented by the amalgamation.
