London, April 9. - The results of the first Irish county council elections, under the new local government act, are arriving slowly. It is known that 300 Nationalists and 83 Unionists have been elected. The results in Dublin county were 13 Nationalists and 7 Unionists; Kilkenny, 20 to 1; King's county, 20 to 1; Mayo, 9 to 0; Westmeath, 21 to 2; Derry Carlow, 20 to 0. Miss Charlotte Barrington, the only woman candidate, was elected in Limerick. Lord Mayo received only 19 votes in Wicklow, and Lord Castletown only 17 votes in Cork. Labor candidates won 11 out of the 16 seats in the Limerick district.

THE CZAR'S PEACE CONGRESS. London, April 10 .- With the appointment of delegates the prospects for a peace conference begin to assume definite shape. All countries have paid the czar a compliment by appointing representatives and commending it in this particular respect. It is remarked here that the czar may regard the kaiser's appointment of Stengel, who regards war as a necessity, and peace as a pernicious sentiment, as a rather bad joke. It is now generally accepted that the conference will accomplish nothing in the way of disarmament, or an agreement to refrain from new scientific discoveries. America and Japan will refuse to consider a reduction of armament, and England will refuse to reduce its army, and has already, without the conference, offered to diminish

MANY DYING OF FAMINE

Two Meals a Wesk-Death List Enormous

London, April 10 .- A dispatch to the Telegraph from St. Petersburg says that the Province of Kason, which is inhabited chiefly by Tartars, is in a condition of unrest, which is likely to result in a bad outbreak against the government. M. Goremykin, minister of the interior, has started post-haste to visit the district. The situation is the outcome of the terrible famine. Everything has been eaten, including cattle which themselves had died of starvation. The people now have only two meals weekly, and are dwelling in half ruined huts, parts of the roofs and the woodwork of which have been used

The sole occupation of the people is burying their fellows, who are dying rapidly of typhus fever. Private benevolence is doing what it can, but it can do but little to relieve the distress. Government aid was delayed owing to the roads being blocked. In many cases peasants have gone a dozen versts to obtain bread, and some of them have died on the way. The peasants in some villages attacked the local authorities, demanding bread, and then assailed the police. The administration at St. Petersburg thereupon decided that energetic measures were necessary to quell the trouble. Large quantities of corn were transported by express trains and distributed among the uals Will Have No Effect Upon the sufferers. Sanitary detachments of the Status of the Army-Malta to Speak | Red Cross Society were sent to combat e typhus and scurvy, but the Red Cross people arrived the Tartars, who are Mohammedans, spread rumors that they had come to advantage of the misery to compel the Mohammedans to be baptized into the orthodox faith. The Mohammedan ferred to the Dreyfus case, the end of priests fostered this idea. Then the rage of the people rose, and they stoned the relief parties and refused help from them. The officials are now tryraveled by the court of cassation, ing to pacify them, and have summoned M. Soultanoff, the Mufti of Orenburg, who will go to Kason to explain the objects of the government.
