# FOR THE EMPIRE

tion To Be Held at London This Summer.

Toronto, May 7.-It is understood that Hon. J. J. Foy, the attorneygeneral, may be appointed to represent Ontario at the imperial conference of education to be held in London this summer. It is believed to be the intention of the Provincial Government to take an advanced stand in educational matters, and the conference may be of much importance to Ontario.

The conference will comprise representatives from the educational departments of all the British dependencies. It will have for its premier object the general desire for uniformity in educational training throughout the empire. It is the first conference of the kind which has ever been held, the plan being formed about two years ago in England with the imperial league and being carried out under the auspices


