Then there is a change in the tone of the Prussian press, or, at least, portions of it. Editorial writers for some of the most influential papers are awakening to the fact that under the present form of government the world is right in considering Germany the main obstacle to world freedom, and they are passing on their gleams of intelligence to the people. Even such a subservient government organ as the Cologne Gazette announces that it would support an immediate change in the Prussian system if the chancellor deemed it advisable.

But behind all this, and much stronger, is the will of the nation. Accustomed for many years to be treated as insensate cattle, the people have been slow to attempt to make their horror of this war and its awful effects known to their rulers in any way which could be construed as savouring of self-assertion. They have, in small numbers and on occasion, been aroused to wrath by starvation or by the sight of some especially terrible examples of war's frightfulness, but for the most part they have suffered in silence.
