New York, Dec. 15 .- A Herald dispatch from Washington says: Representative A. P. Gardner, of Massachusetts, yesterday Introduced in the House a concurrent resolution through which he seeks to put Congress on record against any move on the part of the United States "to participate in promoting an unjust peace" in Europe as a result of Germany's peace proposal. He declared that Germany is suing for peace with the hope that the United States will offer mediation, and adds: 'God help us if autocracy wins!
