JAPANESE CITY FIRESWEPT. Thousand Houses Destroyed-Widesprend Suffering.

TOKIO, Sept. 4.—Despatches from the City of Niigata in the Ichigo Province, 18 miles northwest of this city, tell of a fire in which 4000 houses were destroyed by the flames.

Fearful scenes of destitution and suffering are reported as a result of the disaster and the government is rendering every possible assistance.

Niigata is a city of over 40,000 inhabitants and is an open port on the west coast Island of Hondu.
